Special Fee To Be **Collected on Receipts**

Briscoe County Tax Assessor-Collector Arthur McJimsey has received notification that a special \$1.00 fee will be assessed against each delinquent tax receipt issued beginning February 1, 1972.

The special fee will be payable along with the amount of delinquent taxes, interest and penalty.

Under the system now prevailing the assessor-collector issues to one paying his taxes between January 31 and July 1, a general tax receipt for such taxes due, plus penalty and interest.
