questions.

The public is invited to attend this program, and parents of young children are urged to attend.

National Child Safety Council is a tax-exempt non-profit organization that for 30 years has worked with law enforcement departments and elementary school children. For several years the children in Silverton have been provided with child safety and drug education materials sponsored by the Brissoe County Sheriff's Department.

Top law advisors on the board and council of NCSC say that 150,000 children are disappearing in the United States each year, many from the rural areas where children are not taught as carefully as the city youngsters are to beware of strangers. This figure does not include runaways

are to beware of strangers. This figure does not include runaways or parental abductions. Also, according to the July 1983 issue of Readers Digest, "Children For Sale: Pornography's Dark New World—For pleasure and profit, pornographers have murdered the childhood of a million girls and box?

It appears the most desirable age of children taken is five to nine years. Therefore, the child safety program from kindergarten to fourth grade this year will emphasize "Dangerous Strangers" and each child will receive a booklet entitled "How To Tell The Good Guys From The Bad Guys."



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Farmers Being Required To Harvest For PIK

ASCS requires farmers to obtain loans on 1983 cotton for PIK. Cotton producers in Hall County who are eligible to receive their PIK from Commodity Credit Corporation stocks will have to obtain price support loans on their 1983 production to satisfy 40% of their PIK needs, according to Billy Don Atkinson, County Executive Director. The other 60% will come from cotton already in CCC inventory.

Mr. Atkinson said, "The loans will then be redeemed and sold to the CCC for PIK. Producers who have no 1983 crop cotton for harvest or those who had insuffi-cient cotton for harvest to satisfy their PIK needs will receive their

PIK from CCC stock."

Hall County's cotton producers

List of Eligible Voters Is Posted For ASC Committee Elections

A list of the names of all known eligible persons to receive ballots in the upcoming annual ASC committee election soon will be available at the county ASCS office. Farmers will begin nominating candidates for the ASC election on October 6.

ASCS, an agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, is responsible for farm program administration. 'On the local level, ASCS operates under a farmer-elected committee system. This year's elections will be by mail ballot between November 25 and December 5. Voters may also get ballots at the county may also get ballots at the county ASCS office.

Anyone who meets the follow ing requirements is eligible to vote in these farmer committee elections: any individual of legal voting age with an interest in a farm as owner, tenant, or share-

cropper who is eligible to participate in any ASCS program.

Several general provisions relate to ASCS voter eligibility. The spouse of an eligible voter is also eligible to vote. Any person under legal voting age can vote if he or she runs a farm, and a legal guardian who runs a farm for a child can vote for the child. No person can be denied the right to vote because of race, sex, age,

vote because of race, sex, age, color, religion, or national origin.

The spouse of an eligible voter is also eligible to vote.

A person may cast a ballot in any county in which he or she is an eligible ASC voter, but he or she cannot vote in more than one sne cannot vote in more than one community in the county. If an eligible voter has separate farm interests in more than one community in the same county, special care will be taken to see that only one ballot is issued to that voter. that voter.
