Three persons have filed for two seats on the Board of Trustees. Lecky Fuston, Ronald Lynn Mullin and Dee Whittington will battle it out at the polls on Saturday, May 6, 1989, for two-three terms being vacated by Mack Seymour and Mike House.

In Turkey, the three incumbents were the only ones to file in the municipal election. Maintaining their positions on the City Council are Arlowene Williams, Lorene Setliff and Steve Farley.

Daylight Savings Time will end at 2 a.m. the last Sunday in October when 2 a.m. "falls back" to 1 a.m.

Applications for emergency loans for losses caused by farm conditions are being drought accepted at the Farmers Home Administration office located in

Administration office located in Floydada, Becky Via, County Supervisor said today. Floyd and Briscoe Counties are two of many counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as oligible for logas to cover part of eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting

from the drought. Becky D. Via said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business of \$500.000.00, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

To file a claim: Call, toll free, 1-800-234-5772 to arrange an appointment. For other Social Security assistance: Call, toll free, 1-800-234-5772. To check on a medicare claim that has been submitted: call, toll free, 1-800-442-2620. The telephone number for the Plainview office is 1-806-293-9623

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until November 3, 1989 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possible over into the new farming season," Ms. Via said.

FmHA is a credit agency cf the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest. The FmHA office in Floydada is open from 8 to 5 Monday

through Friday.

Junior events for ages 9-13 are barrel race, pole bending, flag race, steer riding, golfette, calf dobbing and rescue race.



Every newspaper and TV broadcast seems to add one more food to the growing list of those which could be "hazardous to your health." Yet food is our body's fuel to keep us healthy. So how do we deal with this dilemma?

First of all, we must use common sense. If we get paranoid and try to remove from our diet every food that has even been accused of "possibly" causing cancer, we could starve to death. It is also not possible for the entire population of the United States to grow their own groceries, tie a cow in their backyard to provide milk and butter, and add a pen of chickens for healthy poultry and

eggs. Second, the U. S. government has many agencies looking out for has many agencies looking out for our health and welfare. Even though some of the procedures they must use and the limited personnel and budget available may hinder some of their work, the Food and Drug Admin-istration, USDA, the Environ-mental Protection Agency and otheres probably provide us with a otheres probably provide us with a safer food supply than any other country. Of course, sadly there are those who choose to are those who choose to maliciously tamper with our food supply, and we must depend on our protective agencies to always be vigilant in monitoring this.

Third, many of our own health habits and food handling habits could be dangerous as any food we eat. For example, do you always wash your hands before preparing food and wash the produce before eating it? Do you refrigerate leftover food prom-refrigerate leftover food promptly? Do you cook meat, poultry and eggs to the recommended temperature? Do you thoroughly

wash a cutting board after using it. to cut up raw meat before cutting up salad vegetables on it?

Do we monitor our weight, not smoke or consume alcohol in excess, wear seat belts, get medical checkups, and have adequate

I'm not trying to be sarcastic, but we will die from some disease or accident. Our food supply is just one of many possible hazards associated with living each day. We should take all precautions to have our food as safe as possible when we get it and then make sure that we handle it safely once it is in

fearful of every morsel that does into our mouths. The benefits of healthy, nutritious food far outweigh the harms. We must put our food fears in perspective and balance these concerns with all the other lifestyle habits we practice. Our mental attitude about health can also contribute a great deal to our overall health and well being.
