

# Father, Son Reverse Roles On Railroad

The scenic trail being developed near Caprock Canyons State Park along the path of what was the Fort Worth and Denver Railway has brought excitement to Turkey, Quitaque, and other communities close to the park.

But for those who loved the railroad, excitement is tempered by sorrow over the loss of the 65-year old tracks.

Quitaque's Lon McKay, who will be 90 years old in January, has reason to be nostalgic, because he is believed to be the last local man alive who helped build the railroad

For about a dollar and a half a day, McKay worked as part of a crew that built up the rail bed with hauled-in dirt.

We started out with three mules and a dump wagon that had a false bottom in it," he said. "We got dirt out of a hill and put it in the low

A short time later the crew had the luxury of working with Ford tractors, but a man was killed when a tractor "reared up" and fell on him, McKay said. The job foreman approached McKay to see if he would be willing to drive the tractor, and McKay agreed only if he could run a chain under the dirt wagon to the front of the tractor that would keep it on the ground.

The railroad still is providing for a member of his family. His son, Trent McKay, works for Burlington Railroad, the company that ought the Fort Worth and Denver

But what father built, son is tearing down. When Burlington sold the stretch of railroad that will be added to the state park, it em-ployed Trent to help retrieve some of the rails laid back in 1927, on beds his father helped build.


