Shirttail Sermon

"Suffer the little children to come unto me and forbid them not, for such is the kingdom of heaven."

Matthew 19:14

We have all read this passage of scripture and wondered at its meaning. Later in life, we may have had an inkling of its full teaching for us.

We know that a child sees things in a different light from the one in which adults see things. So today we will point out three characteristics that we lose as we grow up.

First, we cease to be receptive. A child is taught by everyone and everything with which he comes in contact. He learns from his parents and other adults, from his peers, from nature, and from his own experiences. These lessons are retained and referred to time after time as he grows older. Adults are not so receptive. They do not learn as easily as a child and do not retain the lessons that are learned. Time after time adults make the same mistakes. Or they hold to old prejudices when those prejudices are proven wrong. "I know I'm wrong, but I can't help feeling the way I do," is their confession. We must be receptive if we are to grow spiritually for

we learn new things every day that we live.

Second, we lose the simple faith. A child accepts things at their face value. If he is told something, he accepts it as truth. "I know it is true, because so-and-so said it was," is often heard as the child's defense of a questioned statement. He has faith in those who are around him and in what they tell him. The hardest lesson a child must learn is that not all people are truthful and honest. He believes, also, what he reads. This is particularly true about spiritual matters. He senses that not all things can be proven scientifically and so he does not often question. Adults are more sophisticated and worldly. For that reason, they accept very few teachings on faith alone. They tend to question every statement that is read or heard. There are some things that can be proven but there are many things that must be accepted with the simple faith of a child.

Third, we lose the feeling of wonder. A child, due to his inexperience, feels a sense of wonder when he sees a blade of grass growing or a rose blooming. He will sit enthralled by an antbed for several minutes. He is captivated by bees in a hive. His cur-

iosity is aroused by the ticking of a clock or watch. The world around him is so strange that everything is wonderful. Adults lose the sense and feeling of wonder. Very few things arouse their curiosity. This is bad because it is the sense of wonder and curiosity that makes man seek knowledge and light.

Some unknown philosopher has said: "When a man loses his faith, ceases to be receptive and forfeits the feeling of wonder, he is already dead. He is than just taking up space."

For her marriage, the bride chose a white crepe dress accent-

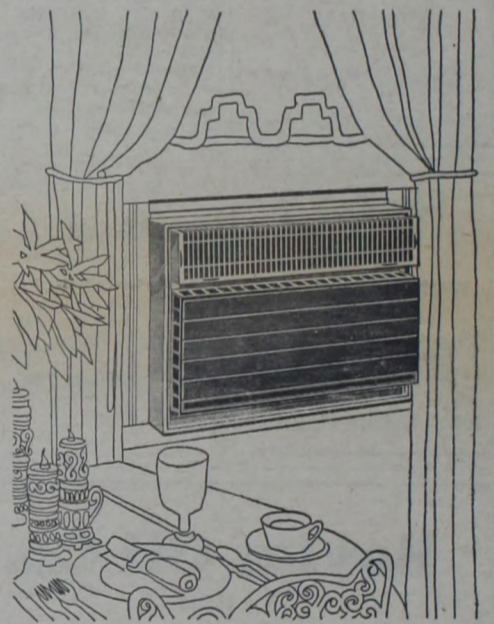
ed with a corsage of yellow flowers.

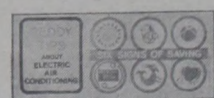

— Home Notes —

Now is the time to start getting your canning and freezing equipment ready so you can avoid delays when your garden is ready. Check your canning jars. Use only jars which are designed for canning as they have been tempered to withstand the high heat of canning. Packers jars (those that other products come in) are made of thinner glass. They also have a narrower sealing edge that lessens the chance of a good seal. Use these "packers jars" for pickles or jelly or any other foods which you do not process.

Run your finger around the sealing edge of your canning jars to check for any chips. A tiny chip could prevent the lid from sealing.


Look through the bottom of each jar toward the window to check for cracks. Don't confuse the seam in the bottom with a crack. A crack will reflect the light, the seam will not. A cracked jar will break when heat is added.

Check your supply of screw bands. Discard any rusty or bent ones. The screw band is designed to apply pressure evenly to the lid and sealing edge of the jar. A bent or rusty one will not apply pressure evenly. Faulty screw bands actually prevent some lids from sealing.

Take inventory of your freezing containers. Do you need to purchase some additional ones? Do it NOW. Life gets tense when the beans are ready and you have to run to town for boxes or bags. Your local merchant may have just sold the last package. Many people have said they are unhappy with their frozen green beans. First, select a good variety for freezing. Gather beans a little less mature than you would for canning. Take the vegetables from the garden to the freezer as fast
