Patriots Whip Bulldogs 54-20 In 9-1 Season Finale

The Valley High Patriots closed out the 1975 football season here last Friday night on a very high note by drubbing the Amherst Bulldogs 54-20, the most points the Patriots have ever scored in their short four years of existence.

The Patriots last week were rated 6th in the State of Texas by the Associated Press (for Class B teams), a rating that wasn't hurt by their impressive win over Amherst, and boast the finest season record of any in the district with nine wins and only one loss. However that one loss was a 10-0 squeaker to Sudan in district play and that knocks out the Patriots chance to go into the playoffs and Sudan will play Sundown for the District title Friday night.

The Patriots won the coin toss last Friday night and received the opening kickoff on their own 2 yard line with no return, thus starting the contest in a deep hole. Barry Wheeler, however, crunched out 10 yards on the first try.

The Patriots kicked off to the Bulldogs to start the second half of play. Ernie Lucero intercepted a pass on the first play following the kickoff, then on the Patriots first play Ron Eudy hit Scotty Setliff who ran it all the way for the score, the play covering about 70 yards. Lucero kicked the PAT and Valley led 27-7.

Amherst scored on their next possession to close the gap to 27-14.

A few minutes later Eudy hit Reggie Cathey with a nifty pass and Cathey made a nifty catch, followed by a nifty run for another TD, the play covering 81 yards. The PAT try was no good and the Patriots led 33-14.

That was all the scoring for the third period.

Amherst scored again early in the fourth period, and on the next possession Eudy hit Setliff for another long pass and run for a TD, then just minutes later Coach Hulsey pulled his seniors out of the game and what will be next year's team pushed over a touchdown with freshman Kenneth Helms going the last five yards. Brian Wheeler also collected another TD in the fourth quarter.

Funds Available For Great Plains Cost-Share Projects

The Great Plains Conservation Program now has more funds available to cost share on conservation practices in Briscoe County.

Conservation practices can be cost shared on cropland, rangeland or pastureland. The cost share rate ranges from 50% to 80% depending upon the conservation practice. Eligible conservation practices that are cost shared are as follows: brush control, diversions, livestock fences, irrigation pipeline, land leveling, livestock wells and pipelines, pasture planting, ponds, range seeding, tail-water pits, terraces, water storage facilities, waterways and windbreaks or shelterbelts.

Interested landowners or operators should contact the Soil Conservation Service at Silverton to apply for the program.

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Ron Eudy Selected As Globe-News Player of the Week

Valley High School's Ron Eudy who quarterbacked the Patriots and who led them to a 54-20 win over Amherst to close out a very fine 9-1 season, is the Amarillo Globe-News Class B Player of the Week. Ron is the second Patriot to be selected for that honor this year. Brian Wheeler was named earlier in the year.

Ron threw four touchdown passes in last Friday night's game, the strikes going for 55, 73, 38 and 81 yards.

Eudy hit 10 of 12 passes the week before against Nazareth, four of them going for touchdowns, Eudy finishing the season with 1,146 yards in the air, hitting 47 of 125, 14 of them going for touchdowns. He rushed 33 times for 179 yards this year.

Brian Wheeler rushed for over 100 yards in the nine games in which he played. He rushed for 1,136 yards in 204 carries and was just as tough on defense.

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Aoudad Season Opens Here Saturday

Sportsmen are awaiting the 1975 aoudad sheep season which opens November 15 and continues through November 21 in four Texas Panhandle counties.

Landowners in Briscoe, Floyd, Armstrong and Randall counties were issued 202 aoudad permits by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The duties of a Texas game warden vary from day to day but releasing an aoudad with a trap on his foot was a new experience for wardens Ronnie Ainsworth of Plainview and Julius Stevens of Tulia.

The chase started when a Floyd County rancher spotted a big aoudad ram that had stepped into a No. 4 coyote trap and was dragging the trap wherever he went. The rancher contacted the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and Stevens and Ainsworth were on their way.

The wardens debated about using horses and roping the ram but after driving the big sheep into a canyon where the trap and drag hung on a rock as the ram jumped over a cliff, there was no time.

Using steel bars and a lot of muscle, the two wardens pried the trap loose from the aoudad's front foot and the aoudad fell to safety below with no visible injuries.

Ainsworth said this particular heap would be especially careful where he put his feet in the future.

These landowners can issue the same permits to sportsmen willing to pursue the elusive aoudad or barbary sheep.

Approximately 35 percent of the hunters are successful in bagging an aoudad as shown by the 1974 P&WD records. A total of 72 sheep were bagged from 203 permits issued last season. Each hunter spent 12.8 hours in the field after his sheep and fired an average of 7.4 shots for each aoudad collected.

Out of the 39 rams and 11 ewes weighed by P&WD personnel, each sheep averaged 140.5 and 81.9 pounds respectively.

Horn measurements taken from 50 animals indicated that the average horn length for rams was 22.7 inches and for ewes 16.2 inches. The largest horn was measured from a ram taken in Randall County that exceeded 32.5 inches.

All the hunters questioned by P&WD officials indicated they had spotted 863 aoudads and compared to the number bagged, this figure illustrates the difficulty hunters had in getting within range of the animals.

Hunters unfamiliar with the aoudad sheep should become acquainted with the habits and characteristics of this imported mountain climber.

The aoudad is rufus or tawny brown with dark brown areas about the head and forequarters. The inside of the legs, the chin, a line on the under parts and the inside of the legs are whitish in color. There is no recognizable color variation between the sexes or between seasons.

The mane on older males may nearly touch the ground even when the head is held upright. A distinctive characteristic is the long, tufted tail which normally reaches the vicinity of the rocks.

Horn characteristics on both sexes include horn tips that remain sharp throughout life and sweep outward, backward, and then inward reaching a tip-to-tip spread of over 30 inches on some animals. A full curl is never reached by the aoudad as on native North American bighorn sheep.

The aoudad is gregarious and generally associates in small family groups consisting of an adult male and female with their young offspring of various ages. They escape detection by remaining motionless rather than leaving whenever danger threatens.

The aoudad is highly resistant to internal parasites which have helped the P&WD transplant these animals to various parts of Texas. Aoudads are adept at climbing and jumping. They have been observed readily jumping a four foot livestock fence and if pressed can jump a seven foot fence, although it will normally contain them. This jumping ability is readily used in the caprock country of the Panhandle.

Hunters looking for a trophy aoudad ram will find the four to seven year old male carrying the longest, thickest horns. The experienced hunter would suggest that you spend 95 percent of your hunting time looking and only five percent walking or you might not see any sheep on your hunt.

SCHOOL NON-DISCRIMINATION POLICY IS REVIEWED

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 and subsequent regulations of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare became effective on July 21, 1975. Title IX specifically states:

"No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."

The regulations instruct the school district to disseminate a policy statement of intent to comply. The following policy statement is submitted:

"The Turkey-Quitaque Independent School District does not discriminate because of race, color, religion, sex or national origin, in the educational programs or activities which it operates, including employment therein."

TITLE IX GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

The primary purpose of this procedure is to provide for prompt and equitable resolution of student and employee complaints alleging any action which would be prohibited by Title IX regulations.

Level One—The resolution of a grievance through free and informal communications as close as possible to the point of origin is encouraged. A student with a grievance may first air it with the principal. A professional employee with a grievance may first take it to the principal while other employees may first take it to the superintendent.

Level Two—In the event the aggrieved person is not satisfied with the disposition of his/her grievance at level one, he/she may file the grievance in writing with the Superintendent of Schools. The superintendent shall render a written decision as to the solution.

Level three—In the event the aggrieved person is not satisfied with the disposition of his/her grievance at Level two, he/she

may request a hearing before the Board of Trustees at their next regular meeting. Such a hearing request would need to be in writing and forwarded to the Superintendent of Schools or President of the Board of Trustees.

Level four—If the aggrieved person is not satisfied with the decision of the Board, he/she may appeal the ruling through another judicial avenue including the courts the Texas Education Agency, or the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.
