

Brucellosis Could Be Problem In West Texas

to be more concerned about "drought" than "brucellosis." In these parts, there's more occurrence of dry, hot weather than of brucellosis, or "bang's," an incurable bacterial disease that can cause cows to abort, deliver weak calves or produce less with calves, or produce less milk. What nay come as a surprise, however, is the link between "drought" and "bang's" in this arid section of the

brucellosis infection in West Texas," said vet-erinarian Jimmy Dusek of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state agency charged with eradicating

Dusek, director of TAHS's Area and his staff of seven animal health inspectors work with runchers and livestock markets in 32 West Texas counties. They have found two basic drought-related factors that contribute to

ucellosis infection. Dusek explained that during a drought, ranchers typically sell off nattle they can't feed or water. When the weather eases, producers have to buy replacement breeding stock. These heifers or cows may come from other states or areas of Texas where brucellosis infection is more

Dusek recommended producers purchase heifers and cows only from herds certified by the TAHC to be brucellosis-free. In Texas, 2,113 producers have earned this certification by having their herds tested annually with no indication of infection. Dusek also suggested ranchers buy helfers that were vaccinated against brucellosis when they were between the ages of four and eight

brucellosis. Keep these additions' to the herd isolated for 60 to 120 days, then retest them before mixing them with the main herd," mixing them with the main herd," Dusek said. He noted that producers should insist on receiving documentation proving that animals have been tested within 30 days prior to their sale. American Heart Association Ginger Ale Sherbet

The special blending of juices and ginger ale create an iced treat you'll want to eat often throughout the summer. Go ahead and enjoy — it's low-salt, no cholesterol and has only a trace of fat.

1/2 cup lemon juice 1/2 cup pineapple juice 3 cups ginger ale

In a saucepan, heat the water and 1 cup of the sugar to the boiling point and cook until the syrup reacher the soft-ball stage — 234° F. to 238° F.

254° F. to 238° F. Beat the egg whites until stiff. Continue beating while gradually adding 1/2 cup of the sugar. Slowly pour the hot syrup into the egg whites, beating constantly until mixture has cooled. Then gradually beat in the ginger ale and fruit juices.

Place in the freezer until partially frozen, then remove and whip quickly. Pour into freezing trays, cover and return to the freezer. The texture should resemble that of an Italian ice.

Yield: 8 Servings

Cooking Tip: Raw eggs separate more easily when they are cold, but to get maximum volume from egg whites, beat them when they are at room temperature.
