## City of $\mathbb{Q}$ uitaque

WHEREAS，it was the intent of the Texas State Legislature by passing Texas Civil Statute Art．4477－9a Litter Abatement Act＂，herein referred to as＂the Act＂，to comply with the Highway Beautification Act of 1965
（Public Law 89－285）to the extent that it is implemented by Congress．This ordinance is conditioned on the provisions of the Litter Abatement Act．
WHEREAS，The legislature declared that to promote the health，safety，welfare，morals，convenience，and enjoyment of the traveling public and to protect the public investment in the highway systems，it is necessary to
regulate the establishment，operation，and maintenance of junkyards and automobile graveyards in areas adj cent to these systems．
WHEREAS，the legislature considers that the landscaping and developing of recreational areas，acquisition of interests in and improvement of strips of land within，adjacent to，or within view of these systems，which are
necessary for the restoration，preservation，and enhancement of scenic beauty，and protecting and providing for the general welfare of the traveling public and promoting the safety of citizens using the highways of this state to be of the highest importance，and

WHEREAS，a junked，dismantled，or wrecked automobile or automobile parts that are located in a place
where it is visible from a public place or public right－of－way is detrimental to the safety and welfare of the general public，tends to reduce the value of private property，invites vandalism，creates fire hazards，constitutes
an unaturactive nuisance creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors，and is detrimental an unatractive
nomic welfare of the state and the City of Quitaque，by producing urban blight adverse to the maintenance and continuing development of this municipality，and is a public nuisance，and；

WHEREAS，the legislature has defined a junked vehicle to be a vehicle that is inoperative and one that doe not have la
cate，that is wrecked，dismantled，partially dismantled，or discarded，or that remains inoperable for a continu－ ous period of more than 45 days，and；
WHEREAS，it is found that this ordinance is for the good government，peace，and order；and for the trad and commerce for the City of Quitaque；and is necessary and proper for carrying out a power gran

7．It is required that not less than 10 days＇notice stating the nature of the public nuisance on private
property be mailed，by certified mail with a 5 －day return requested，to the last known registered owner of the property be mailed，by certified mail with a 5 －day return requested，to the last known regiatered owner of the the public nuisance exists；or if the post office address of the last known registered owner of the motor vehicle is unknown，notice to the last known registered owner may be placed on the motor vehicle，or if the last known registered owner is physically located，the notice may be hand－delievered．If any notice is returned undelivered
by the United States Post Office，official action to abate the nuisance shall be continued to a date not less than by the United States Post Office，official

13．The procedures may not apply to a vehicle or vehicle part that is completely enclosed within a building in 13．The procedures may not apply a venicle or vehicle part manner where it is not visible from the street or other public or private property a vehicle or vehicle part that is stored or parked in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a
licensed vehicle dealer or junkyard，or an unlicensed，operable，or inoperable antique or special interest vehicle stored by a collector on the collector＇s property，if the vehicle and the outdoor storage area are maintained in a manner so that they do not constitute a health hazard and are screened

14．These procedures must be administered by regularly salaried，full－time employees of the City of Quit
except that the removal of a vehicle or vehicle part from property may be by any duly authorized person．
15．A person authorized by the City of Quitaque to administer the procedures authorized by this article may enter private property for the purposes specified in the procadures to examine a vehicle or vehicle part，obtain
information as to the identity of the vehicle，and remove or cause the removal of a vehicle or vehicle part that constitutes a nuisance．An appropriate court in the City of Quitaque or a Court in Briscoe County issue orders necessary to enforce these procedure
16．A vehicle that is taken by the city under this ordinance is prohibited from being reconstructed or made
17．Notice of this action is to be given to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation not later than the fifth day after the date of removal identifying the vehicle or vehicle part and requesting the
department to immediately cancel the certificate of title to the vehicle pursuant to the Certificate of Title Act department to immediately cancel the certificat
