### Wheat Reduction Program Explained

College Station-The wheat farmer who signs a contract with the Government to reduce his acreage for 1934 and 1935 is paid for his cooperation in the form of a cash premium on that part of his crop used for hdman consumption in the United State Extension Service officials at Texas A and M College explain. It is an effort, they say, to give the farmer a price on 54 percent of his crop sufficient to make it equal the prewar purchasing power of wheat. For the 1933 crop, growers who sign contracts are promised 28 to 30 cents per bushel less local administrative costs for 54 percent of their average proin line with the county fivey-year average for the period 1928-32.
