Two residents of Briscoe County were killed and three others were injured when their pickups collided Sunday evening at the intersection of State Highway 207 and Farm Road 145 south of Silverton.

Jorge T. Angeles, 41, of Quitaque, driver of one of the pickups, was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident, according to Briscoe County Justice of the Peace Dale Ramsey of Quitaque

Isidro M. Moreno, 42 of Silverton, a passenger of the other pickup was also pronounced dead at the scene

All the Emergency Units of Silverton EMT and Fire Department responded to the call for help. Both EMT units from Quitaque responded to the call. The Jaws of Life had to be used to extricate the men from the wrecked vehicles. Two Aero-Care Helicopters from Lubbock were used to fly the critically injured men to Lubbock. No one was taken by ambulance as they ere too critical






