### BRISCOE SOCIAL SECURITY MONTHLY BENEFITS TALLIED

Social security benefits paid to residents of Briscoe County totaled \$35,000 a month as 1969 ended, Travis C. Briggs, social security district manager, reported today.

A benefit increase, signed into law by President Nixon on December 30, 1969, has since raised the monthly rate of payment by 15% for the 449 social security beneficiaries in Briscoe County, Briggs noted.

Of the social security beneficiaries living in Briscoe County, 291 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 120 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, and 26 are getting benefits as disabled workers or the dependents of disabled workers.

Briggs pointed out that although the majority of social security beneficiaries are older people, about one out of every four is under age 60.

In the State of Texas, 321,147 people under age 60 are collecting social security payments each month. The 186,789 who are under 18 are receiving payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits.

Of the 30,272 who are 18 - 21 years of age, most are getting students' benefits under a provision which permits the continuation of a child's benefits past his or her 18th birthday, and up to age 22 if he or she is attending school full time.

But in this 18 to 22 age group are some other types of beneficiaries, illustrating the broad family protection that is provided to working people of all ages under the social security program.

A number are the children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers who became disabled before they reached 18 and who will probably never be able to go to work and become self supporting. The benefits of these young people, severely handicapped by physical or mental disabilities, will continue indefinitely and benefits are also payable to their mothers if the disabled son or daughter is in the mother's care.

Another small but significant group of youthful social security beneficiaries are those who are receiving social security benefits as disabled workers. Under a 1967 change in the law, disability benefits can be paid to a person who

### FOOD STAMP PROGRAM TO OPEN IN EIGHT WEST TEXAS COUNTIES

Grocers and banks in eight West Texas counties will be contacted by a U. S. Department of agriculture representative during the next few weeks in preparation for the opening of the Food Stamp Program in the area.

Garza, Dickens and Borden counties are scheduled to begin issuing food coupons within the next few weeks, along with the Panhandle counties of Armstrong, Briscoe, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall. So reports John J. Slaughter, southwest regional director of the Food and Nutrition Service — the agency administratively responsible for USDA food programs.

James Montgomery, a career official with USDA's Food and Nutrition Service, will be meeting with wholesale and retail grocers and bank officials to explain how the Food Stamp Program will operate. Commissioners in the counties recently signed agreements with the Texas Department of Public Welfare, which directs USDA food programs in Texas.

### LETTER TO THE EDITOR — DEAR EDITOR:

While I watch the actions of  
 my nation closely, I have never  
 violently protested government ac-  
 tions abroad. I have never ad-  
 vanced revolution as the solution  
 to America's problems. I have  
 written my Congressmen and the  
 president to encourage them when  
 I agree and to discourage them  
 when I oppose their policies. I

am convinced that my country is  
 the stronghold of world freedom.  
 This is the first time I have writ-  
 ten so openly what I feel.

My country, the United States  
 of America, has managed to se-  
 cure for myself, and all her citi-  
 zens, a measure of freedom un-  
 equaled anywhere in the world.  
 Such liberty did not mystically  
 appear in North America two  
 hundred years ago. You need only  
 look at the Declaration of Inde-  
 pendence and the Constitution to  
 realize that. Deliberate and re-  
 sponsible hands forged those docu-  
 ments because of "a long train of  
 abuses" at the hands of "absolute  
 Despotism." The revolution in  
 1776 was not endorsed by light-  
 headed, irresponsible freedom

seekers. As testimony to their dis-  
 cretion about so grave a matter,  
 they also wrote that "Prudence,  
 indeed, will dictate that govern-  
 ments long established should not  
 be changed for light and transient  
 causes." Let us remember these  
 words when thoughts of revolu-  
 tion enter our minds.

Our Constitution was establish-  
 ed to "secure the blessings of li-  
 berty to ourselves and our pos-  
 terity." Our government has ac-  
 complished this with amazing clari-  
 ty and genuineness, and perhaps  
 this is so because we Americans  
 have been concerned not just for  
 our own rights, but for the rights  
 of all mankind. No political at-  
 mosphere is more healthy than a  
 democracy. What socialist or  
 communist government better en-  
 courages prosperity, love for man-  
 kind, or freedom of choice? Is it  
 not foolish to cry out for revolu-  
 tion in a democratic nation such  
 as ours? For us the ballot box has  
 replaced the need for a gun, and  
 the majority rules. With revolu-  
 tion the existing establishment  
 might be destroyed, but what bet-  
 ter establishment would replace  
 our democratic republic? Only the  
 fool tears down his brick home  
 when he possesses only materials  
 and know-how enough to rebuild  
 a lean-to. Our nation is not per-  
 fect, but that is because humans  
 are not perfect. She is the best we  
 have or can conceive of having.  
 Only the fool would discard her  
 before finding something better.  
 Until then I will continue to salu-  
 te her flag. I am free to make  
 that choice.

I can choose my own goals in  
 America. I can also choose just  
 how hard I will work as I try to  
 reach those goals. I can work to-  
 ward becoming a big time execu-  
 tive or a small time bum. I can  
 choose to influence my govern-  
 ment's policies by becoming a  
 democratic precinct chairman, or  
 by leading a sit-in at the local

federal building. I can choose to  
 serve the human race by wearing  
 my country's uniform and fight-  
 ing world tyranny, or by trying  
 to save my friends' lives as I en-  
 courage them to dodge the draft.  
 I can make many choices, but the  
 quality of my government de-  
 pends upon how responsible we  
 citizens are.

Vietnam, and more recently  
 Cambodia, have shown what sort  
 of stuff we freedom loving Amer-  
 icans are made of. The wool has  
 been pulled over our eyes, our  
 enemies are laughing at us, and  
 all the while we are bickering  
 over trivialities. We are again  
 faced with a choice. Choices are, for  
 us, exercising freedom in the light  
 of our responsibilities. We are  
 free to make the decision that will  
 most benefit our goals.

Twenty-three short years have  
 taught me that one thing is cer-  
 tain: every freedom granted to  
 man carries with it a correspond-  
 ing responsibility. When South  
 Vietnam called for help in stop-  
 ping aggression we had a choice  
 to make, and a corresponding re-  
 sponsibility to fulfill. Our choice  
 was a simple one. Would we, as  
 we stand on the side of freedom,  
 decide that this conflict was not  
 worth our support? We might, on  
 the other hand, have decided that  
 this Asian conflict was a real and  
 present threat to freedom, and  
 thus use our powerful influence  
 to halt the enslavement of South  
 Vietnam. It appears we met our  
 obligations, took the responsible  
 approach, and offered aid to the  
 fight for liberty. Our positive re-  
 sponse kept alive the hope for  
 freedom around the globe.

Now, responsibility has sudden-  
 ly turned sour, and America has  
 become irresponsible. Our popula-  
 tion has decided that "human suf-  
 fering and enslavement by Com-  
 munist need evoke no response

from the United States." This is  
 the fruit of irresponsibility and  
 apathy, and I am ashamed of it.

Our responsibility was, and al-  
 ways will be, to wield our power-  
 ful influence in such a way as to  
 preserve world peace and protect  
 those nations that are left in the  
 free world. Such a policy is in  
 our own interest. The Soviet  
 Union and the U. S. have far sur-  
 passed all others in military cap-  
 abilities. Whether we like it or  
 not, our freedom has produced a  
 fantastic responsibility—the pre-  
 servation of the world balance of  
 power. In the face of such an  
 awesome task we have degenerat-  
 ed into irresponsible gluttons,  
 feeding ravenously and apatheti-  
 cally upon our own freedom, while  
 caring nothing about the freedom  
 of others.

The actions of dissidents in our  
 nation reveal their true nature.  
 It must be irresponsibility which  
 forces protestors to call policemen  
 "pigs," and yet be offended when  
 the President labels them "bums"  
 because they ransack offices, hurl  
 deadly rocks, burn buildings, and  
 advocate violence and revolution.  
 It must be irresponsibility which  
 leads to the random use of the  
 names of American war casualties  
 in a moratorium peace march,  
 thus disgracing those dead who  
 would have considered such ac-  
 tion to be giving aid and com-  
 fort to the enemy who killed  
 them. It must be irresponsibility  
 which demands the immediate  
 withdrawal of troops from Viet-  
 nam with no regard for the dan-  
 ger the South Vietnamese would  
 face as Communists terrorized  
 their villages. It must be irres-  
 sponsibility which produces lives  
 revolving around "the hypnotic  
 beat of amplified rock," lyrics a-

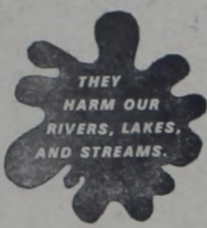

How to avoid unnecessary service bills---and beat inflation!

It's easy to avoid unnecessary appliance service calls.

How? Just be sure something's wrong with the appliance before you call a service technician.

Proof lies in the fact that appliance service companies report on automatic washers alone, about 40 per cent of first-year service calls could be avoided.

Service calls on most appliances could be avoided by following these two simple rules.

First, learn all you can about your appliance.

Second, check a few simple items before you call a technician. Not only is it embarrassing to have a service technician tell you the machine isn't plugged in or that a fuse is blown... it can be expensive, too.

How do you learn about your appliances?

When you purchase an appliance, ask the salesman for the owner's manual and installation guide before the unit is delivered. Then sit down with a cup of coffee and read both manuals thoroughly.

The owner's manual is your textbook and the salesman and service technician are your teachers. But it is your responsibility to use them. Ask questions. Don't be satisfied with the answers until you understand your appliance completely. And keep instruction books nearby for quick reference.

If you have lost your owner's manual, write the manufacturer. His address and model number (be sure to give the model number) will be stamped or printed on the appliance.

With proper use and care, you can expect years of trouble-free operation from your appliance. However, as any other machine, appliances may need occasional adjustment.

But, before calling the service technician check these

items. They are the most common sources of unnecessary service calls:

1. Electric cord. Is it plugged in? This does happen.
2. Pilot light. Is it lit? Check your owner's manual before trying to light it.
3. Power source. Has a fuse blown or a circuit breaker moved to the off position?
4. Controls. Are they set correctly? Be positive by checking your owner's manual. Give pushbuttons an extra firm push and turn dials in the proper direction.
5. Lights. If not on, check the power source. If the bulb's burned out, your owner's manual will tell you type of bulb needed for replacement.
6. Dust, lint and dirt build-up. This reduces efficiency. Washer filters (if not self-



cleaning) and dryer lint screens need to be cleaned after each use.

Dust and dirt can block your air conditioner filter. Check your owner's manual for instructions in changing or cleaning the filter.

Dust and dirt will also build up on the coils, back and beneath refrigerators and freezers. They should be cleaned periodically with a brush or vacuum cleaner attachment.

7. Water supply. Is water flowing into the appliance? Be sure faucets are turned on and hoses not kinked.

8. Doors and latches. Are they properly closed? Most appliances will not operate correctly unless doors and latches are closed tightly.

That's how to avoid the most common unnecessary appliance service calls. However, specific appliances have operating parts that may pose questions in your mind. These will be answered in future articles.

If you've made the basic checks and read your owner's manual and the appliance still doesn't operate correctly... it's time to call for help.

But don't call any fix-it man down the street. Get the job done right. Call your dealer and ask him to recommend a manufacturer's authorized service technician... or contact the manufacturer directly.

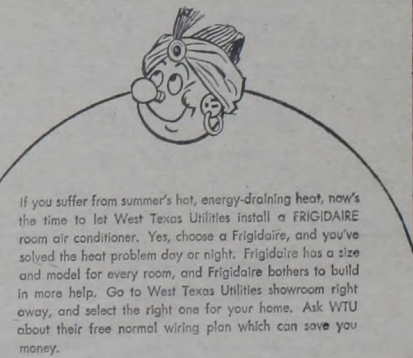
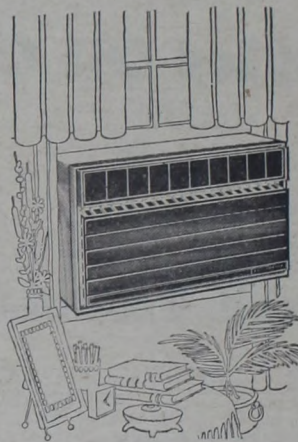

Sponge cake layers put together with jam and sprinkled with confectioners sugar is a dessert named after Queen Victoria.

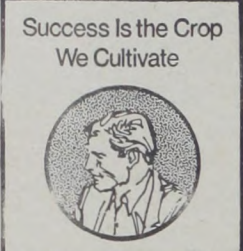
**Victoria Sandwich**

¼ cup corn starch  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
½ teaspoon salt  
2 eggs, separated  
½ cup corn oil  
½ cup water  
Grease 2 (8 x 1½-inch) layer cake pans; line with waxed paper. Sift flour, sugar, corn starch, baking powder and salt together. Combine egg yolks, corn oil and water lightly with fork and stir into dry ingredients. Beat egg whites until stiff peaks form; fold into flour mixture. Pour into prepared pans. Bake in 375° F. (moderate) oven 25 to 30 minutes or until top springs back when touched. Remove from pans; cool. Sandwich layers together with raspberry jam and sprinkle with confectioners sugar.
