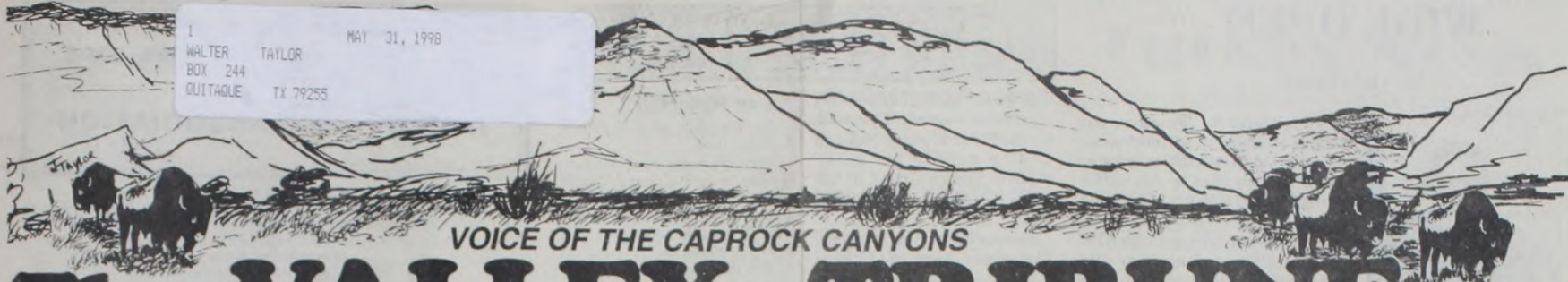

"A very nice gentlemanly boy," is how Hank describes the King. "We were on a tour with him and Johnny Cash and one night backstage Elvis sang some country songs for us. I told him "Elvis, that just isn't your bag but those blues numbers you were doing on stage, that's what you excel at and that's what people want to hear from you. Stick with that."

Henry William Thompson was born in Waco in 1925. When he was four years old he got his first guitar, a \$4.00 Vernon. While in high school he got a 15 minute spot on WACO radio station. He was known as Hank the Hired Hand. With the \$5.00 a week he earned he bought a real guitar, a Gibson J-200

Firemen Quench Six Fires In March

During the month of March the Quitaque Volunteer Fire Department has responded to six potentially dangerous fires.

The first of these occurred on March 1, 1998 at the Marie Purcell farm. Approximately 150 acres of grass was burned. Eight members of the Volunteer Fire Department responded to the fire. Fire departments from Turkey, Silverton and Floydada also helped to control this fire.

Quitaque EMT personnel were also on hand in case of a medical emergency.

On March 9 the group rushed to a call for help five miles south and three east of Quitaque which damaged 250 acres of grass.

They responded to a call for mutual aid to the Turkey Volunteer Fire Department on March 11 to a fire four miles northeast of Turkey in which 650 acres of grass was destroyed. Five members of the department responded as well as the EMT personnel.

On Thursday, March 12 seven firemen hurried to help the Turkey Fire Department control a fire four miles Northeast of Turkey in which 500 acres of grass were burned. Again the EMS were at the scene.

Also in the month of March as earlier reported there was a fire at the First Baptist Church and one at the Catholic Center.

The Volunteer Fire Departments from both Quitaque and Turkey are always ready to help in an emergency. They need all the help and support that the public can give them. Please be careful with anything that has the potential to start a fire.

When are we as a people going to stop this? Do we really like being used as a training exercise for a bunch of rookies? Do you not care just because it hasn't happened to you? Do we really want to end up like the Jewish people in '30's Germany? It's happening right now and as long as it doesn't affect you, you'll never know til one day you wake up and it's you being arrested in your own home, but there's no one left to help because they too are all in jail.

I love my country, but I fear my government. And if you're smart, you will, too.

"The time and money you spend on maintenance and service will extend the life of your vehicle and will give you peace of mind" advise the experts at the National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) - a nonprofit organization that tests and certifies the competence of automotive repair technicians.

- Correct problems with hard starts, rough idling, stalling, etc. before hot weather sets in.
- Flush and refill the cooling system (radiator) according to the service manual's recommendations. The level, condition, and concentration of the coolant should be checked periodically. (Never remove the radiator cap until the engine has cooled!)
- The tightness and condition of drive belts, clamps, and hoses should be checked by a qualified auto technician.

• A marginally operating air conditioner will fail in hot weather. Have the system examined by a qualified technician.

• Change oil and oil filter as specified in owner's manual.

• Replace other filters (air, fuel, PCV, etc.) as recommended.

• Check the condition of tires; make sure that the spare is okay and the tire jack is in good working condition. Let tires "cool down" before checking their pressure.

• Inspect all lights and bulbs; replace burned out bulbs.

- Replace worn wiper blades and keep plenty of washer solvent on hand.
- Emergencies: Carry some basic tools - ask a technician for suggestions. Also include a first aid kit, flares, and a flashlight. Consider buying a cellular phone.
