Do you not care just because it hasn't happened to you? Do we really want to end up like the Jewish people in '30's Germany? It's happening right now and as long as
it doesn't affect you, you'll never know til one day you wake up it doesn't affect you, you'll never know til one day you wake up
and it's you being arrested in your own home, but there's no one left to help because they too are all in jail.,
I love my country, but $I$ fear my government. And if you're smart, you will, too.
