Not only is this an eyesore, and unsanitary, it is also illegal. Landowners can be fined by the Environmental Protection Agency if solid waste is found on their property. Even if they are not fined, clean-up can be very expensive.

In order to protect themselves, and their property, the landown-ers may be forced to prosecute in the event they find someone, or direct evidence linking someone to the dumping.
