Dumping on Roadsides, Others' Property Not A Texas Neighborly Thing to Do

With the no-burn ordinance, and the installation of the new dumpsters, we are beginning to see some new problems. People have begun to dump on the side of the road, and on other people's property.

Not only is this an eyesore, and unsanitary, it is also illegal. Landowners can be fined by the Environmental Protection Agency if solid waste is found on their property. Even if they are not fined, clean-up can be very expensive.

In order to protect themselves, and their property, the landowners may be forced to prosecute in the event they find someone, or direct evidence linking someone to the dumping.
