were present at the 4 o'clock meeting BCACT's attorney, William Warnick was on hand to once again explain his client's position and intent.

L. B. Garvin presided over the 10 minute meeting, elected by a majority vote last offering the resignation of year, was under fire from a Ross at the onset of the proceeding. Ross was not

present at the meeting.

The commissioners did vote unaimously to re-open the 1990 budget process X decision on the possible tax rollback (or increase) was not on the agenda, therefore, no vote was taken on that matter. The Briscoe County Com-missioners Court will hold

their regular scheduled meet-Monday, September 9,

1989, at the County Courthouse. The agenda has not been prepared at press time. It is not known if the commissinners will appoint a replace

replacement is no med.

In a press release to the media dated September 28, 1989, Ross stated 'I have had the honor of aerving the people of Briscos County as judge for the past two years. During that

time, we have examined the need for a more diverse economy and have taken some initial steps to make Briscoe County an even better place to live. There is still work to be done.

I have submitted my resignation as county judge effective immediately. I do so to pursue other interest and to spend more time with my

If you are between the ages of 62 and 64, each dollar you earn above **\$6,480**, will reduce your Social Security benefits by 50 cents.
