Progress Report Given By Fire Department

Fire Chief David Brunson, President Jerry Maupin and Hose Captain Rex Harmon met with the City Council Monday night, December 6, to give the following progress report for the Quitaque Fire Department.

The Quitaque Fire Department was re-organized in February 1976 with 19 members. Since that time the membership has grown to a total of 27 members, with an average of 17 to 20 members present at each drill. Drills are held on the second and fourth Mondays of each month and last for two hours.

During the ten months since the re-organization, the Department has moved its drills to the old highway building which was given to them by the City. Since moving, there has been much repair work done on the building. A new water line had to be run from the main line to the building, an air conditioner was installed, the toilets and lavatory were replumbed, the front was repaired and painted, seats were donated by the First Baptist Church, a Coke machine and coffee put were added, and a base station CB is being installed to use in fire calls and during storm watches.

An Army truck was secured through Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and is in the process of being converted to an out-of-town and grass fire fighting truck. The truck will also be of great help on fires in town.

Repairs on the building and materials for the truck were paid for through the selling of old batteries, CB posters and fire extinguishers.

Also, during these ten months, nine members of the Department attended a fire fighting school in Canyon, and several are planning to attend the week-long school at Texas A&M this summer. There were also nine members who attended an Emergency Medical Technician Course and are now certified EMT's. There are also several members interested in taking the course in January. These extra EMT's will be very helpful since the Fire Department also operates the Ambulance Service.

The Department is also checking with some sources trying to locate funds to build a new fire house so that both trucks and the ambulance can be parked at one location.

In first round action at Kress, Nazareth won over Valley 60-40 in girls action. The Patriots battled the Swiftettes on even terms until the Valley guards got into foul trouble in the third period and had to ease off. The Swiftettes jumped into a 12-8 lead at the end of the first quarter but the Valley girls battled back to even it at 22 at halftime. Going into the fourth quarter Valley trailed by only six, 32-38, but after losing two starting guards the Swiftettes pulled away for the win. Sherice Price sparked the Valley girls with 28 points.

The Valley boys had better luck in the first round and won over Nazareth 41-28 with Kenny Chandler hitting the basket for 17 points.

In second round action the Valley girls won over Lubbock Christian 50-26 with Sherice Price again hitting for 22 points for Valley.

Lubbock Christian took a 15-point, 61-46, win over the Valley boys. Kenny Chandler scored 16 points in this one.

Tuesday night the varsity teams drove down to Matador and split a pair of games with the varsity teams. The Valley girls won 39-31 to record their second win over Motley this season. Jena Mullin sparked the Patriots in this one, hitting for 17 points. This one was quite a game, going into overtime before the Patriots took charge. Valley led 8-6 at the end of the first quarter but trailed 14-15 at halftime. Valley led 20-17 at the end of three quarters but it was 29-all at the end of regulation playing time. The Patriots took charge in overtime and scored 10 points while allowing Motley only two points.

The Valley boys trailed most of the way in their game and Motley got a bit of revenge for the loss to the Patriots in the Estelline Tournament earlier in the season. Ron Eudy popped the nets for 23 points to lead all shooters.

The Valley varsity teams are entered in the Tulia Tournament this weekend and both teams will play Slaton in their opening round games Thursday with the girls playing at 1:00 and the boys game scheduled at 2:30.

Next Tuesday night the Valley teams will host the Motley teams in a four-game set-to with festivities due to start at 4 o'clock.

The next scheduled games are December 21, when Estelline comes to Valley.
