City Improves 50 Year Old Water System

In October 1984 the Texas Department of Community Affairs awarded the City of Quitaque a grant of \$234,800 for the aquistion of a new


water supply for the City. With this grant the City acquired 30 acres of water rights south of town. Two wells were drilled and pumps were installed. Over 22,000 feet of 8 inch transmission

line was laid to the storage facilities in town. The schage from these wells contains less than half the amount of selenium and nitrates that the selenium and mitrates that the City's previous water supply contained. This is a tremendous increase in the quality of water now supplied for public use. Other projects completed with grant funds include,

AUSTIN - The creation of e Hall County Hospital the Hall County Toop District was all a mistake. the Texas

Under the Texas Constitution, Hall County officials must be authorized by the Texas Ligislature before they can create a hospital district. The only problem is that the county did not know about the

constitutional requirement and created the hospital hospital district by a vote of the people last August.

"It's been a comedy of errors," acknowledged Hall County Judge James E. Chappell.

According to Chappell, county officials decided to form the hospital district to provide health care for indigents and to operate the to Chappell, county hospital in Memphis.

They then researched state

that a district could be created under the optional hospital district law of 1957, Chappell said. He said county officials also were told by the Texas Attorney General's Offi that the law they were using General's Office form the district was the correct one.

However, the constitution requires counties to have a population of at least 197,000 before they can create a districy under the optional

law. "Of course, we don't have 97,000 population, much less the 197,000, "Chappell said. County officials learned of

their mistake only recently, when they asked state Rep. their mistake only recently, when they asked state Rep. Foster Whaley, D-Pampa, to introduce a bill that would enable them to have an elected hospital district board. The commissioners court currently serves as the





A member of the council staff discovered Hall County's mistake while doing the research for the board election bill. The election held to create the hospital district was illegal, and therefore the district is not a valid entity. Whaley said he plans to file a bill next week that will remedy the situation by validating the district. "We'll run a corrective and validadating bill, which we don't anticipate having any problems with," the legislator said. An item from Indexing in the Childress Index by Morris Higley -Since Childress County will be 100 years old this April, why not name the new highway through Childress "Centennial Avenue of Highway" - just through the city limits of the town? Higley stated - "Now, I don't want someone to say that it is a good idea that it be named that because it seemed to take 100 good idea that it be named that because it seemed to take 100 years to build it, even though it has seemed that way to some. I'm betting that it will be finished before April 11, the date the county was formed."

Going over last year's receipts, cancelled checks, W-2 forms and other papers to get ready to face the tax man is definitely not fun! But it's even worse when you begin to wonder where the money
