The Texas Farmers Union to-day announced that a group of Texas farmers and ranchers were part of a National Farmers Union Fly-In to lobby Congress and the U. S. Department of Agriculture for major action to improve farm prices February 23-26. Jimmy Myers and Calvin Shel-ton, both of Silverton, were among the group in the nation's cap-ital in Washington, D. C.

According to Farmers Union President Jay Naman, the Texans were part of about 200 farmers from three states who asked for a meeting with Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz.

"These rural lobbyists were seeking a firm positive commit ment from Secretary Butz on U. S agricultural export policy and the outlook for farm policies and pri ces for the remainder of 1976,' Naman said.

The state farm leader also not ed that the Farmers Union mem-bers were on the Hill lobbying Congress for legislation to in crease the estate tax exemption and for the Young Farmer Home stead Act, introduced by South Dakota Senators George McGovern and James Abourezk.






