## Editor's Note

The second class mail in-county rate, under which the Valley Tribune is mailed, increased from 5.8 percent to 7.9 percent which is 36.2 percent increase January 1, according to the Texas Press Association. This makes a big difference in the cost to the small newspaper. There is no way to print another paper unless you, our subscribers, will help us. On March 1 the subscription rates in Briscoe County and the adjoining counties will increase to \$9.50 plus 49 cents for tax, for a total of \$9.99 per year.

Subscriptions mailed to other Texas counties will be \$10.50 plus 54 cents tax, a total of \$11.04 per year.

The charge for mailing to other states will be \$10.50 per year, with no tax required.

The Quitaque Tribune was started in 1960 after a fire had destroyed the former newspaper plant. The editors, the Gaston Owens, drove ten thousand miles getting used machinery to open another plant. Anyone who has bought used machinery knows how much time and trouble it takes to get the "kinks" out before it can be used. As many of you know, the editors stayed up all night every Thursday night until 1970 when the editor suffered a heart attack. The Briscoe County News began printing the Valley Tribune at cost to themselves both physically and monetarily. They have been very good to help Quitaque have its own newspaper.

The Turkey area was added to the Valley newspaper about the time the Briscoe County News began doing the paper. The Valley newspaper has had two editors since Turkey was included, yet Turkey doesn't at times think this is their newspaper. The accounts have been handled separately. The main office, and the hardest work of trying to keep everything paid up and keep it legal is at the Quitaque plant, but that is the only difference.

According to the 1985 income tax, the Valley Tribune probably lost more than it cleared last year. It couldn't have stayed open in either place if the two editors were not on Social Security.

There are so many things now that have to be printed in a LEGAL newspaper and that doesn't include a SHOPPER, whatever its name. The school has to run its district bids on school bus sales, or anything that is to be sold, in a county newspaper. It is not legal otherwise. Also, anything that the city has to sell or make money in any way, must be run in a LEGAL newspaper. In the past, they have gotten by with running it in a SHOPPER or even mimeo-

graph, but now, those things have to be sent to the state offices. The political advertising must be run in a LEGAL newspaper. Many other things can't be run in a shopper or a direct mail circular.

If the Valley Tribune closes, the city, school and many other businesses will have to drive thirty miles to the closest newspaper and get a permit, because if the Valley newspaper closes and the merchants don't support the Briscoe County News, it will probably close too.

The one dollar increase in the cost of the newspaper for a year won't go far in production costs. That will be less than one dollar a month, for the most costly of the year's subscriptions.

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**Don't Mess  
 With Texas!**

Strewing trash along Quitaque's highways and byways constitutes a crime. Statewide, this crime cost Texas taxpayers \$24 million in 1985, according to new figures released by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Make no mistake, roadside trash is by no means solely a local problem. It's a statewide mess, and the cost is increasing annually by 15 to 17 percent. During the last year alone, the cost of cleaning up this Texas mess has increased by \$4 million, or 15 percent. The figures from the highway department cover September 1984 through August 1985.

The greater the cost, the fewer tax dollars there are available to repair and build roads. Besides, it's just plain ugly.

"To combat this increase of cost and litter, we have implemented a major antilitter program to support local organizations like "We the Women," the Lions Club and Chamber of Commerce," said Don Clark, director of the highway department's information services section.

The department has initiated a three-pronged battle plan against trash that includes a media campaign aimed at habitual litterers, a statewide beautification and clean-up program, and incentives for increased law enforcement.

"We the Women," Quitaque Chamber of Commerce and Lions Club will play a vital role locally

and clean-up program, by generating support from Quitaque's private sector. "We hope to discourage all litterers in Quitaque and make them think twice before using the roadside and city streets as their personal litter receptacles," said Clark.

And, since the fine for littering can be as high as \$1,000, it seems that thinking twice is mighty good advice.

As to the media campaign, Texas celebrities are already singing the antilitter battle cry. Radio listeners throughout Texas can strum along with country western singer Johnny Rodriguez, and rock 'n roll with Johnny Dee and the Rocket 88's.

Their message is: "Don't Mess With Texas."



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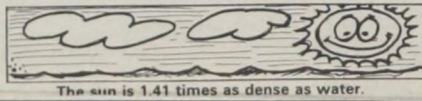

**HEALTH NOTES**

Coronary heart disease causes more premature deaths than any other disease. We don't know exactly what causes some people to have heart problems while others escape them. But we have identified some factors that increase your chances of developing heart disease. You can eliminate some of these risks completely by simply changing your habits. Many of the other factors can be controlled. Knowing the coronary risk factors and working with your doctor to eliminate or control them can help combat this killer.

Smoking is the number one risk. The risk of heart attacks is doubled in heavy cigarette smokers. Fortunately, if you stop smoking, the risk decreases almost to the same level as for people who never smoked.

High blood pressure affects nearly one in every five American adults and serves as a warning that your heart is working harder than normal to pump blood through your body. When high blood pressure is not treated it leads to damage to blood vessels that feed the heart, the brain, and the kidneys. Uncontrolled blood pressure is the major cause of heart attacks, strokes and kidney disease.

Like hypertension and smoking, high cholesterol is an important risk factor. If your diet contains too much fat, you increase your chances of getting deposits on the walls of the arteries. To cut down on cholesterol, replace red meats, like beef, with lean meats, like fish, chicken, turkey and veal. Use vegetable oils instead of butter.

Like other muscles, your heart needs exercise. Regular exercise strengthens the heart and improves the flow of blood. People who are more than 20% overweight have three times the risk of high blood pressure. Heavy

drinking of alcoholic beverages can raise blood pressure. If your mother or father, sister or brother has high blood pressure, you are more likely to have it. Men with high blood pressure have a greater risk of developing serious heart disease than women. Women taking birth control pills have a greater risk of heart disease. People who live under constant pressure or stress are more likely to have a heart attack than people who live at a more relaxed or slower pace.

**DID YOU KNOW ?**

Small Taxpayers Can Take The IRS To Court

Thanks to a little-publicized law effective since 1971, small taxpayers can contest what sometimes appear to be final and arbitrary Internal Revenue Service decisions in disputes involving less than \$5000.



The number of taxpayers using their rights to this process—a streamlined way to be heard—is increasing every year. Settlements in taxpayer's favor already run into the millions. In many instances, the services of an attorney are not needed.

Preparing and submitting an appeal is described in a booklet based on U.S. Tax Court instructions. It includes printed examples of the two essential petition forms plus a list of more than 100 cities where a case can be heard.


Junior certainly enters life completely preoccupied with himself. But once he begins to walk and talk—gosh how his world balloons!

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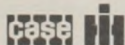
