### Editor's Note

The second class mail in-co ty rate, under which the Valley Tribune is mailed, increased from 5.8 percent to 7.9 percent which is 36.2 percent increase which is 36.2 percent increase January 1, according to the Texas Press Association. This makes a big difference in the cost to the small newspaper. There is no way to print another paper unless you, our subscribers, will help us. On March 1 the subscription rates in Par subscription rates in Briscoe County and the adjoining coun-ties will increase to \$9.50 plus 49 cents for tax, for a total of \$9.99 ner was \$9.99 per year.

Subscriptions mailed to othe Texas counties will be \$10.50 plus 54 cents tax, a total of \$11.04 per year

The charge for mailing to other states will be \$10.50 per year,

with no tax required. The Quitaque Tribune was started in 1960 after a fire had destroyed the former newspaper plant. The editors, the Gaston Owens, drove ten thousand miles getting used machinery to open another plant. Anyone who has bought used machinery knows how much time and trouble it takes to get the "kinks" out before it can be used. As many of before it can be used. As many of you know, the editors stayed up all night every Thursday night until 1970 when the editor suffered a heart attack. The Briscoe County News began printing the Valley Tribune at cost to themselves both physical-ly and monetarily. They have been very good to help Quitaque have its own newspaper. have its own newspaper. The Turkey area was added to

The Turkey area was added to the Valley newspaper about the time the Briscoe County News began doing the paper. The Valley newspaper has had two editors since Turkey was includ-ed, yet Turkey doesn't at times think this is their newspaper. The accounts have been handled separately. The main office, and the hardest work of trying to Separately, the main of trying to keep everything paid up and keep it legal is at the Quitaque plant, but that is the only difference.

According to the 1985 inco tax, the Valley Tribune probably lost more than it cleared last year. It couldn't have stayed open in either place if the two editors were not on Social Security.

There are so many things now that have to be printed in a LEGAL newspaper and that doesn't include a SHOPPER, whatever its name. The school has to run its district bids on school bus sales, or anything that is to be sold, in a county newspaper. It is not legal other-wise. Also, anthing that the city has to sell or make money in any way, must be run in a LEGAL newspaper. In the past, they have gotten by with running it in a SHOPPER or even mimeo-There are so many things now

If the Valley Tribune closes, the city, school and many other businesses will have to drive thirty miles to the closest newspaper and get a permit, because if the Valley newspaper closes and the merchants don't support the Briscoe County News, it will probably close too. The one dollar increase in the cost of the newspaper for a year won't go far in production costs. That will be less than one dollar a month, for the most costly of the year's subscriptions.

this crime cost Texas taxpayers \$24 million in 1985, according to new figures released by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. Make no mistake, roadside trash is by no means solely a local problem. It's a statewide mess, and the cost is increasing annual-ly by 15 to 17 percent. During the last year alone, the cost of cleaning up this Texas mess has increased by \$4 million, or 15 percent. The figures from the highway department cover Sep-tember 1984 through August 1985. 1985.

The greater the cost, the fewer tax dollars there are available to repair and build roads. Besides, it's just plain ugly. "To combat this increase of

"To combat this increase of cost and litter, we have imple-mented a major antilitter pro-gram to support local organiza-tions like "We the Women," the Lions Club and Chamber of Commerce," said Don Clark, director of the highway depart-ment's information services sec-tion tion.
