Turkey Residents Warned of Nitrate In Water-Advised to Protect Infants

The Texas Natural Resource Commission has tested Turkey water samples, and found that Nitrate/Nitrite is 13.40 mg. This is a high enough level to cause concern among parents of very young infants.

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) sets drinking water standards and has determined that nitrate poses an acute health concern at certain levels of exposure. Nitrate is used in fertilizer and is found in sewage and wastes from human and/or farm animals and generally get into drinking water from those activities. Excessive levels of nitrate in drinking water have caused serious illness and sometimes death in infants under six months of age. The serious illness in infants is caused because nitrate is converted to Nitrite in the body Nitrite interferes with the oxygen carrying capacity of the child's blood. This isan acute disease in that symptoms can develop rapidly in infants. In most cases, health deteriorates over a period of days. Symptoms include shortness of breath and blueness of the skin. Clearly, expert medical advice should be sought immediately if these symptoms occur.

Letters have been sent out to notify Turkey residents of the results of the nitrate test, to encourage parents and other respon-sible parties to provide infants with an alternate source of drinking water. Local and State health authorities are the best source for information concerning alternate sources of drinking water for infants

TNRCC has set the drinking water standard at 10 parts per million (ppm) for nitrate to protect against the risk of these advers effects. It has also set a drinking water standard for nitrite at 1ppm. To allow for the fact that the toxicity of nitrate and nitrite are additive, TNRCC has also established a standard for the sum of nitrate and nitrite at 10 ppm. Drinking water that meets the TNRCC standard is associated with little to none of this risk and considered safe with respect to nitrate.



Let Them Through....It **Could Be You!**

provided by Calley Payne, CEA-FSC National statistics show that impared driving is at its peak during holidays and that nearly half of all motor vehicle fatalities are alcohol-related. With this thought in mind, it might be a good time to review some points regarding emergency vehicles as they respond to an increase in calls.

In an emergency, minutes can mean the difference between life and death, and critical seconds can be lost if drivers don't make way for emergency vehicles. Take sirens seriously--make way for an anbulance, fire truck or police ve-

hicle. What can you do? There are some simple things to help emer-gency personnel reach a person in need. Use the letters S-I-R-E-N to remember the right way to yield to an emergency vehicle.

S: Stay Alert--Drive defensively, keep the noise level down in your car and look for more than one emergency vehicle approaching when you hear a siren

I: Investigate--Check your rear-view mirror, scan in front and on both sides of your vehicle, try to estimate the closing speed of the emergency vehicle and plan your

R: React -- React quickly, but calmly and scan in all directions before pulling over. Always use a turn signal when exiting the road-way and don't slam on the brakes or

road, make a visual sweep in all directions, turn on your signal, and gradually merge back into traffic. N: Never-don't stop at a place

that doesn't have enough room to pull over safely and never follow or try to out run an emergency vehicle. At intersections, be alert for pedestrians who may be in the cross-walk or at the edge of the roadway. On the highway, always use your signal, pull as far off the highway as safely possible and gradually brake to avoid losing control. As pedestrians, always check for

turning vehicles before you step into the street. Be sure to stop at the curb, look left, right and left again before crossing the street. Keep looking for vehicles.

As bicyclists, always wear a helmet on every ride and equip your bicycle with reflectors on the front and rear. Bicyclists must obey traffic laws that apply to motor vehicles.


