



If you don't drink milk because you simply don't like it, Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionists recommend eating more of other foods that include calcium. High calcium foods include those made with milk or cheese and tofu, a soybean product that is often made with calcium sulfate. Dark green leafy vegetables and tortil-las made with cornmeal also provide some calcium. Canned or dried fish with edible bones, such as salmon, will also contribute calcium to the diet.
