County Commissioners, Precinct I - Larry Maddox,



Be Traditional But Be Safe This New Year's Holiday

This doesn't have to happen and there are some ways we can prevent ourselves from becoming a victim according to Trooper L. B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety. "Planning is the key to a safe holiday. For instance, if you are hosting a party, inform all guests that they will not be allowed to drive in an intoxicated condition. Take up their car keys as they come in and keep a watchful eye throughout the event. Be prepared to take your guest home or make other arrangements for their safe return," Snider sug-

"If you know ahead of time that you will be drinking, have a designated driver who is re sponsible for all driving. It's important that these plans be made ahead of the drinking because we know that sometimes our best intentions go out the window after a few drinks,'

While you may think that one or two drinks have no affect on you, any amount of alcohol in you bloodstream can affect how you think and react. Each year over 20 000 DWI related fatalities in the U.S. attest to that

"When you think about it, there is really no excuse for drinking and driving, especially during this holiday. Troopers will be on the look-out for impaired drivers and if we catch you, you have more to lose than ever before under new DWI laws in Texas," Snider concluded.




