An important school election has been called for the Quitaque, Flomot, and Turkey Independent School Districts on July 10, 1971. The election will be held to determine whether or not the three districts are to consolidate. A few weeks ago petitions were circulated in the three districts by the local boards, and were then presented to the Commissioners Courts in Floyd, Briscoe, Hall and Motley counties, who in turn authorized the election. This may well be the most IMPORTANT ELECTION in the history of the Quitaque, Flomot, and Turkey communities—so it is imperative that everyone fully understand the consolidation proposal. With this in mind, over the past few weeks we have discussed the election extensively with several of the school board members of the three districts. We asked them for answers to the questions that we had, and requested other information on areas most often misunderstood. Here are some of the questions and the answers received:

- Q. If the election passes in each District, when will actual school consolidation begin?

- Tentative plans are to continue the three schools in their present locations during the 1971-72 school term, with actual consolidation of pupils to take place in the fall of 1972.

 Would a completely new school system be constructed, and if so, where?

 Yes, plans are to build a new high school and grade school plant. The school would be located in some central location between the three towns that is agreeable to the three boards.
- How would a school board be selected for the new District?

 A plan now under consideration among the three boards is to place the names of all seven present school board members on each District's ballot July 10. Voters would then cast a "straw-vote" for only two members of their PRESENT BOARD, and the two top men would represent their District until a new board could be officially elected next spring. It is felt that this would clearly outline the PEOPLE'S
- board could be officially elected next spring. It is felt that this would clearly outline the PEOPLE'S CHOICE for a new school board.

 What about taxes if a new school is built?

 The Texas Education Agency has determined that even with a new school plant the local taxes would be VIRTUALILY UNCHANGED from their present levels in the new district. This is possible because of the Incentive Aid payment that will be made from the state to the new school district. This payment could be as high as \$600,000.00 in all, and will be paid over the next 10 years. This amount would go a long way toward paying for the ENTIRE COST of a new school system. (The Incentive Aid payment was covered more fully in last month's "Comings, Goings, & Doings.")

 Will residents get a chance to vote if there is to be any change in the District's bonded indebtedness? Yes, increases in bonded indebtedness of the new district would have to be voted on and approved by the

- Wouldn't a new centralized school slowly kill the communities of Quitaque, Flomot, and Turkey by attrac-
- ting businesses closer to the new school?

 No, for the school area would be "zoned-off," with no businesses allowed in that area. It would be handled in a manner similar to the Springlake-Earth school, which voluntarily consolidated some 15 years
- Are there dangers involved to individual rights if consolidation plans are delayed?
- Yes, definitely. It is a known, but carefully guarded fact, that strong forces are at work in Austin on a new COMPULSORY consolidation plan similar to the one attempted two years ago.

 Suppose we consolidate the three schools and a new state law is passed. Could we keep our new District?
- Education officials have assured the three boards that they are solving their problems by consolidation. The new District will be upgrading its educational facilities, assuring a more economical operation, while forming a larger district with a more centrally located school plant. The legislation approving Incentive Aid for the new District was also adopted primarily because of our sparsely populated area, where school bus travel to a county-seat town would involve long and sometimes hazardous trips. Insofar as the Texas Education Agency is concerned, consolidation of the three Districts would assure a local school for MANY YEARS TO COME.
