"FACES OF THE WEST" INSPIRED BY WILLS HERITAGE

Recent work by Texas artist, Cindy Wills, will be exhibited at the newly renovated Sportsman Restaurant in Quitaque, Texas from April 19-25. Coinci-ding with the Bob Wills Festival in neighboring Turkey on April 24-26, "Faces Of The West" pays tribute to the spirit of the Cap Rock and the people who "make their own rules". Inspired by the artist's experiences in Turkey over the past five years, "Faces Of The West" is a collection of woodburning images on basswood, as well as, a series of paintings using a combination of crayola and

watercolor. Cindy Wills, Youngest daughter of Western Swing creator Bob Wills, inherited the tradition of being born to art and spending life at its develop-ment. Aside from studying at the University of Alaska at Fairbanks, she is primarily self-taught; and like her father's music, her work is personal, imaginative, and chamingly provocative. For her, art was not an educational or career choice or so much a moment of decision, as it is what she does. "I think that's why i'm so inspired by this part of Texas;" she says,"there's such sterngth and belief in indi-

Extension horticulturist Dr Jerry Parsons says consumers will find the new "junior" petunia more exciting. He said the problem with old fashioned petunias is that they've lost their luster.
Texas horticulturists have cor-

rected the color problem through cross breeding. They went back to the original, as parsons puts it, the mother of all petunias, the VIP. VIP stands for very important petunia or Violet in Profusion. Researchers crossed it with the old fashioned pe-tunia and came up with a beautiful purple bloom and vigorous green foliage. The junior petunia incorporates the attractiveness and the hardiness of poth plants.

Junior is Texas tough. It tolerates 100 degree summer heat and has proven to withstand temperatures down to 15 degrees. The junior petunia is being test marketed in San Antonio

handle Heritage Memorial Trailride will once again hit the trail. This year the net proceeds of the trail ride will go to Make-A-Wish Foundation of the Texas Plains. Their motto is "No one stands taller than when they stoop to help a child!"

Some changes have been made this year due to circumstances beyond their control. This year they will be having a medley of rides; beginning as in the past at the Figure 3 Ranch's "Cowboy Mornin' Breakfast."

Two options are available. The first is the Medley Ride which will be from the North rim of Palo Duro Canyon on the Figure 3 Ranch down into the canyon and along Dry Creek Trail to where it intersects the Prairie Dog Town fork of the Red Raiver, then eastward to the bridge at Texas Highway 207, a distance of 16 miles, and the lunch site. This will be the end of the first leg of the Saturday ride. Sweet Potatoes As **Ornamental Plants**

Stephen F. Austin University horticulturist Greg Grant says even an inexperienced gardener can grow an ornamental sweet potato. It likes well drained soil and full sun and does not need ideal bedding condi-tions. Grant says it makes excellent ground cover growing about a foot tall and four to five feet wide. He says start one potato in a container and plant it in mid-April to early May. It will last until the first fros

Water Gardens Trendy

by Calley Payne, CEA-FCS For years, rock gardens were popular. Now the pendulum is swinging the other way and water gardens are trendy. Water adds a restful dimension to a landscape. The motion and sound create a sense of peacefulness.

People are also discovering how versatile they are. You don't have to dig a big hole in the yard. You can make smaller water gardens in portable clay, plastic or wooden containers. Extension horticulturist Dr. Bill Welch says the water needs to be at least 18 inches deep and the aquatic plants will do best if they have at least half a day of direct sunlight. Welch says the underwater, potted plants need to be repotted once a year to keep them healthy. The pool should also be cleaned at least once a year. Welch says your goal should be a balance between water, plants and animals. Fish, frogs and snails help keep down insect populations and algae
