

breath analysis instruments. Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, director of the Department Public Safety said that 450 highway patrolmen and sergeants last week completed training in use of the "breathalyzer" which analyzes a suspect's breath to determine the percentage of alcohol in bloodstream

The DPS recently secured Federal grant of \$114,627 to launch the breath testing project. Funds obtained under the grant were matched with State funds and used o buy 90 breathalyzer instru-nents, to hire six additional chemists for supervision of the pro-gram, and to train the DPS peronnel in use of the equipm

"We plan to locate breathalyzers in about 80 of the state's most populous countries where the drivng while intoxicated problem is greatest," Speir said. "Trained ersonnel will use the instruments under rigidly controlled scientific conditions," he added.

ects who consent to the test will accompany the highway patrol to an office where an instrument is blow into a tube attached to the alcohol in his blood will register on an indicator on the instrument's

"The test will be of special value persons suspected of being to persons suspected of being drunk, but who are driving erratially due to illness or other ons," Speir said.

DPS officials believe the pro-gram will establish the value of breath testing by contrasting its effectiveness with contiguous areas which do not have it. And they hope the project will ultimately delineate the need for a chemical test law and implied consent law for control of the driving while intoxicated problem in Texas.

The magnitude of the problem is reflected in studies conducted by the DPS. It is believed that _ de pending on area — the use of alco-hol figures in from 40 to 50 per cent of the traffic deaths in the state. Based on the 1967 traffic death toll of 3,367, the use of alcohol may have accounted for 1,347 to 1,684 fatalities.



Proper Harvesting Essential For Quality Cotton

With so much emphasis on the production of quality cotton, farmers in Briscoe County should take a close look at their harvesting oprations

Key factors for a proper harvest: Lint moisture should be down to about eight percent. This point is reached when the relative humidity in the field is 60 percent or below. Moisture can also be checked by collecting a few locks of cotton and squeezing them in the palm of the hand. If the cotton balls up it is too moist. If it fluffs out, harvesting can begin.

2. Harvest-aid chemicals permit earlier harvest of mature cotton. For defoliaiton, at least 60-65 percent of the bolls should be open and a minimum of 80 percent or more should be open when dessicants are used. Use of these chemicals before bolls

5. Careful operation of the stripper is important. Driving the machine off-center on a row re-sults in skinning pieces of bark from the base of the stalks. Excessive stripping roll press ure or too much speed can cause the same problem.
"Barky Grades" will generally grade under USDA cotton class6. Seed cotton should not be s ed on trailers if the moist re level is above 12 percent. See quality will also be redu d drastically if stored with a hat amount of trash.

7. Seed cotton should be ground or separated when any differe in quality is suspected. Grooting should be based on varies irrigation or dryland, dise or insect damaged, hail da aged, lint moisture and pla ing date.

All these items make for morderly, efficient ginning as w Such problems as mix-packs ginning at improper moisture le result and cotton so classed is automaticaly reduced a full thus far, have been doing a co mendable job with the block g ning program.
