

Elections For Cities & School Set For May 4

Your opportunity to elect the governing bodies for the Cities of Quitaque and Turkey, and Valley School will be Saturday, May 4, 1991, at the Community Center in Quitaque and the Bob Wills Center in Turkey, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Historically, city and school elections do not draw many voters even though these are the governing bodies that deal with the issues that most affect citizens of our communities and our school. In the 1990 city election for the City of Quitaque, only about 15% of the registered voters choose to cast their vote.

Frequently, city and school ballots feature uncontested races. Many voters stay at home with the false belief that these candidates will be automatically elected. In an area city, during last year's election, an incumbent Mayor was defeated by a write-in vote. This city had approximately 7,000 registered voters, and the write-in candidate won the election with only 35 votes. YOUR VOTE DOES COUNT.

Candidates listed on the ballot for the City Council for the City of Quitaque are: Randy Stark, Johnny Harrison and Jimmy Davidson. The election will be for three full terms.

Candidates listed on the ballot for the City Council for the City of Turkey are: Place 2: Buster Hanna and Russell Yates; Place 3: Rick Mullin, and Place 5: Ray Whitaker.

Candidates listed on the ballot for the Valley School Board of Trustees are: Rusty Henson, Robin Harmon, Dee Whittington, and Larry Price for two full terms and Russell Sargent and Don House for one unexpired term.

Speaks At Annual Chamber Banquet

Dr. Flores Encourages Quitaque Progress Through Historical And Ecological Aspects

The Quitaque Chamber of Commerce held its annual banquet at Valley School Thursday, April 25. A good number of people turned out to celebrate the past successful year and look forward to a prosperous future. Special guests included Gary Pittner, John Keel, and Jon Sessions from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

After a delicious banquet meal, the chamber officers and directors for the coming year were presented. The officers are: President, Steve Ulrey; president-elect, David Brunson; first vice president, Karol Pigg; second vice president, Johnny Harrison; secretary-treasurer, Billie Jeanne Griffin. The Directors are comprised of persons from civic groups and the community at large. The 1991 Directors are Randy Stark, Delene Tyler, Jerry Maupin, O. R. Stark,

James Brunson, Angie Smith, Elgin Conner, Phyllis Bowman, Grady Tyler, James Cathey, Janice Henson, Johnnie Morrison and Debbie Wellman.

Steve Ulrey began the evening program by spotlighting some of the local business persons present who are engaged in accommodating the traveling public: James and Jean Cathey of the Big C Trading Post, Jack and Debbie Wellman of Farley's Variety Store and Jack's Auto Repair, Dona Smith of Smith's Bed and Breakfast, Lyn and Jana Payne of Lyn's Hunting Guide Service, Joe and Virginia Taylor of Buzzard Holler Attractions, Randy and Linda Stark of Unique Temptations, Steve and Julie Ulrey of Caprock Tours, and representatives of our friendly, growing community.

Karol Pigg gave an inspiring talk citing attractions recently placed in front of the Valley Farm

Store as examples of what it takes to get the attention of people passing through.

Rusty Sargent, Park Superintendent of Caprock Canyons State Park, discussed some of the latest improvements at the Park. The Park and Community are working together to entertain the 200,000 plus visitors who are expected to visit here during the coming year.

Briscoe County Judge, Jimmy Burson, who was accompanied by his wife and daughter, set the tone for the evening with some great western songs.

Dr. Dan Flores, Texas Tech History professor and author of Caprock Canyonlands, illustrated his provocative talk with spectacular slides and startling charts. He discussed the historical significance and the ecological importance of this area.

Dr. Flores closed his talk by outlining some of the ideas which

are currently being proposed by persons in the academic world for this area. He shook most of those present with his discussion of the work of Frank and Deborah Popper of Rutgers University in New Jersey. The Poppers are doing serious work on the creation of huge wilderness areas on all of the plains, from Montana to the Big Bend. They are getting as specific as designating which counties in this vast expanse of territory should be targeted for wilderness designation in their project called The Buffalo Commons. Briscoe County and several others in the Texas Panhandle were on their list.

Chamber president, Steve Ulrey, stated that the view held by many extreme environmentalists and animal rights people lies at the opposite end of the spectrum from what most local people stand for. "We hold a very deep respect for the fragile ecological balance typical of our area and we want to see it preserved. We do not think this means the exclusion of people from living here!" said Ulrey. The insight of Dan Flores helped all who heard realize just how critical the work of economic development is to our future.

Bill To Affect Local Area

The Texas State Senate is presently considering a bill, already passed by the House, which provides for issuance of a "conservation permit" by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to anyone desiring to use land under the control of the department. According to the language of the bill, this includes any use of land for a consumptive or non-consumptive purpose.

The local area will be most directly effected by the requirement of this additional permit in order to gain admission to State Parks. Announced plans of the Parks and Wildlife Department indicate this fee could be as high as \$25 per year. The "conservation permit" would be in addition to any other fees, rates, or permits.

The City of Quitaque and the Quitaque Chamber of Commerce have joined area groups and newspapers who have gone on record in opposition to the proposed permit. The Parks and Wildlife Department sees this step as a lucrative money making move. Opposing groups view the increase in fees imposed on Park visitors and campers as a deterrent to use by travelers and local residents.

If the legislation is passed by the Senate, it will then be up to the Parks and Wildlife Commissioners to implement. Sources in the Parks and Wildlife Department indicate this matter may be brought before the Commissioners this summer, in order for it to be in place in September.

But, what about those few who deal daily with those types of emergencies, who remain familiar with an ambulance on a day-in, day-out basis?

During May, 1991, in keeping with Texas EMS Awareness Month, Quitaque Ambulance Service will be explored from several different angles.

Back in the days before Quitaque had an ambulance, most emergency assistance calls were handled by the funeral homes. It took a courageous soul who had no facilities to assist the patient other than just to transport as quickly as possible.

In 1976, Quitaque received its first batch of Emergency Medical Technicians and its first new ambulance. Times had changed drastically as hospital care became extended more into the field.

The first two classes locally were taught by George Nussbaum. Others who have taught EMT classes through the years include W. J. Copeland, Anthony Kingery and Steve Farley.

Training involves a 124-hour classroom instruction along with 24 hours in-hospital training, and a minimum of three ambulance runs. Each EMT must pass a State test on material learned as well as be able to pass performance tests on all the skills!

To keep up his certification, an EMT must have 80-120 continuing education hours every four years to re-certify. He is required to re-test on book knowledge as well as to re-test on all skills at the end of that four-year time period.

Talk and dominoes were enjoyed by all following the meal.

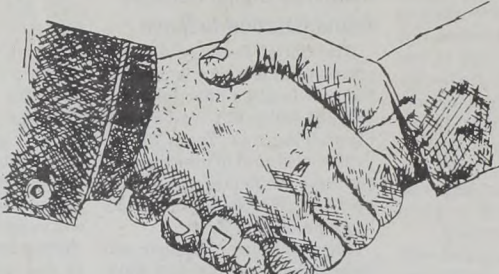

Coming: "Environmentally Friendly" Cars

If you're like most Americans, you are choosing "green" products over those considered hazardous to the Earth's health.

According to a national study conducted earlier this year by Advertising Age, a leading marketing industry trade publication, 79 percent of the 1,514 respondents considered themselves "environmentalists" who purchase consumer products which are environmentally friendly. The survey asked the respondents to judge the perceived "green" reputations of 49 national companies, covering both disposable and durable goods, including automobiles.

Overall, the domestic car makers were generally considered more environmentally conscious than their Japanese counterparts. Surprisingly, the European auto manufacturers were not included in the "green" survey, despite their industry-leading efforts to protect the environment.

One of these European car companies, Audi had had significant success in building an "environmentally friendly" automobile, without sacrificing performance or passenger comfort.

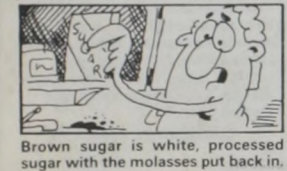
