

The Texas State Senate is presently considering a bill, already passed by the House, which provides for issuance of a "conservation permit" by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to anyone desiring to use land under the control of the department. According to the language of the bill, this includes any use of land for a consumptive or non-consumptive pur

Local Area

The local area will be most directly effected by the requirement of this additional permit in order to gain admission to State Parks. Announced plans of the Parks and Wildlife Department as \$25 per year. The "conservation permit" would be in addition to any other fees, rates, or

The City of Quitaque and the Quitaque Chamber of Commerce have joined area groups and newspapers who have gone on record in opposition to the purposed permit. The Parks and Wildlife Department sees this step as a lucrative money making move. Opposing groups view the increase in fees imposed on Park visitors and campers as a deterrent to use by travelers and local residents.

If the legislation is passed by the Senate, it will then be up to the Parks and Wildlife Commissioners to implement. Sources in the Parks and Wildlife Department indicate this matter may be brought before the Commissioners this summer, in order for it to be in place in September.

Training involves a 124-hour classroom instruction along with 24 hours in-hospital training, and a minimum of three ambulance runs. Each EMT must pass a State test on material learned as well as be able to pass performance tests on all the

To keep up his certification, an EMT must have 80-120 continuing education hours every four years to re-certify. He is required to re-test on book knowledge as well as to re-test on all skills at the end of that four-year time period





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
