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## Texas Tech's Animal Judging Team

Texas Tech University's six-man livestock judging team is conducting three workouts weekly in preparation for intercollegiate contests in October and November. They are Korky Wise, sr. of Santa Anna; Jerry Smith, jr. of Hart; Lonnie McDonald, Quitaque; Eddie Holland, Llano, and Carl Jones, Whitharral. They are coached by Jim McManigal of Happy, a graduate student in animal nutrition who did his undergraduate work at Texas A&M University. On Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays, the team and their coach travel over portions of West Texas and New Mexico to ranches, farms and feedlots to judge beef cattle, swine, sheep and quarter-horses. McManigal, son of Mr. and Mrs.

Morlan McManigal of Happy, and the team are working under a new addition to Tech's Animal Science Department, Max Lennon, who, in addition to his other duties, is faculty member in charge of the livestock judging program. The first big event for this senior livestock judging team will be the intercollegiate livestock judging contest held in conjunction with the American Royal Livestock Exposition in Kansas City October 17. Tech's team will compete with groups from many colleges and universities throughout the nation. The second will be the International Livestock Exposition in Chicago November 23. "We will leave Lubbock on October 13 for the Kansas City competition," Lennon said, "and we will visit at least two ranches and

and was a member of the livestock at Oklahoma State University and Kansas State University for workouts on the way. We will have an even heavier schedule of stops and workouts on the way to Chicago later." Lennon said he and his associates are working on a long range plan to strengthen the livestock judging program and "we will be utilizing the efforts of graduate students with our judging teams when they are available." Lennon came to Texas Tech after receiving his doctorate in animal science last August from North Carolina State University. Prof. Lennon received his bachelor's degree from North Carolina State in 1962 with a major in animal husbandry. He was named outstanding senior in the department by the Block and Bridle Club

judging team. Four years later he received his doctorate from the same institution. As a graduate student he received a research assistantship and served as laboratory instructor in animal science courses. During 1969 he was selected to the top 25 per cent of the teaching faculty in an evaluation by students. From 1962 to 1966 he owned and operated a general crop and livestock farm in Columbus County, North Carolina, where he produced registered Polled Hereford beef cattle, hogs, tobacco, corn, peanuts, soybeans, and small grain. He received the Jaycees Outstanding Young Farmer Award from the Bladenboro chapter in 1966. He was president of the Columbus County Pork Producers Association in 1965. — (Tech Photo)

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## New Horizons Still Ahead

MONDAY, OCTOBER 12 — COLUMBUS DAY

The sight of a new country, and the uncertainty of what lay beyond its shores, held a powerful fascination for one so adven-



turous as the sailor Columbus. Yet the trials and tribulations of financing the voyage . . . of securing a crew . . . are well known to boys and girls in the grades. The confidence, and the unswerving faith in that confidence, that inspired Columbus to start on a treacherous journey that was ridiculed and doomed to failure at the outset should serve as an example for every American.

Would it not be an appropriate time to reaffirm our confidence in the United States, and to look to the new horizons that are before us.

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## Shirttail Sermon

"Be watchful, stand firm in your faith, be courageous, be strong. Let all that you do be done in love." I Corinthians 16:13

Often at a public gathering it is not unusual for the master of ceremonies to interrupt the show to ask, "Is there a doctor in the house?" In this day we ask the question, "Is there a man in the house?" Not just any man, or someone that looks like a man, but is there a man, a real man, in the house?

What kind of a man are we looking for? Perhaps we might say that he is a "solid" man.

In his novel, "My Shadow Ran Fast," ex-convict Bill Sands gives a vivid picture of prison caste society as he found it in San Quentin Penitentiary. The men most admired and respected by the prison inmates were the "solid guys." The trait of being "solid" embodied a wide variety of qualities, including the ability to stand pat, to keep one's mouth shut under

real pressure, to keep promises made to other "solid" people, to die, if necessary, before letting down another "solid guy" and to really live by the Golden Rule with other "solid" people. Warden Duffy was that kind of man. He was tough, but he was fair, he cared, and he believed in men. They recognized him to be "solid." In other words, what they at their best wanted to be.

Perhaps the first quality of a solid man is that he is a responsible man, standing on his own two feet. He supports his family. He assumes and discharges responsibilities honorably. You know where he stands. You can depend on him.

Then, too, he is an understanding man. He has learned to put himself in another man's place, to see life through another's eyes. He is like Ezekiel, who, going to minister to the exiles in Babylon, did not say a word for seven days. "For seven days," he says, "I sat

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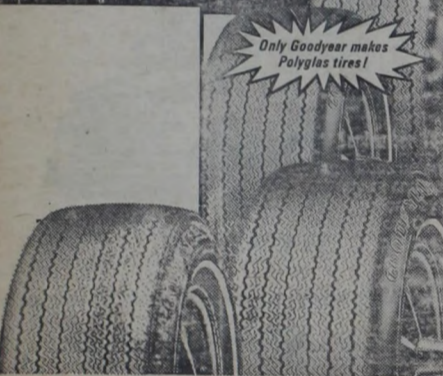

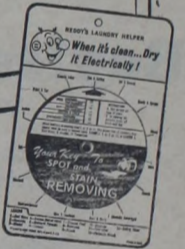
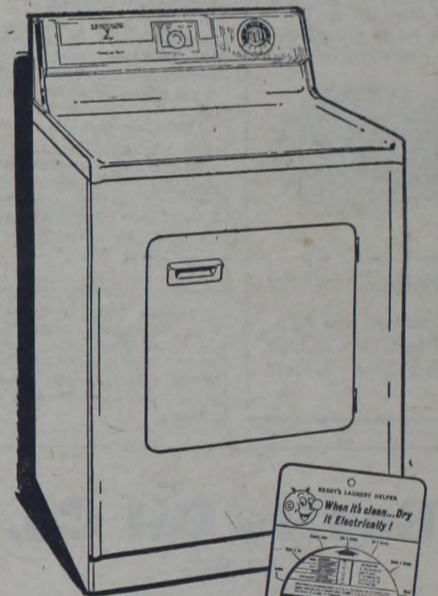
