BALLOTS HAVE BEEN APPROVED FOR PEANUT GROWERS VOTE

eanut growers check-off referen um have been approved for the September 24th crop assessment vote, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White announced today.

Peanut farmers will be asked to complete three majof sections of the ballot, White said. The first proposition is a vote on the selfassessment program. Candidates for Commodity Producers Board which will administer the checkoff funds are listed in the second section of the ballot. The third secion provides a space for the grow er to indicate his last year's pro duction in pounds on the ballot

duction during the last crop year are still eligible to vote, White pointed out. However they must certify on the ballot that they are new producers.

The Southwestern Peanut Grow. ers Association at Gorman is the official body conducting the refer-endum. Information relating to Turkey High School production is available at all County ASCS offices.

that peanut growers are eligible to vote on candidates for the Commodity Producers Board regard less of whether they vote yes or no on the referendum propo-Decisions of the elected board members will affect all pea-

It is essential that growers in dicate their last year's production in pounds on the appropriate secion of the ballot," White said.

Ballots must be mailed to the polling site before midnight, September 24, 1969. Votes will be counted by a committee consisting of a County Judge for the area affected, a representative of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, a representative of the Texas Department of Agriculture, observers from the Southwestern Pea-nut Growers Association, and other persons deemed necessary Election procedures must be approved by the Commissioner
