

Dear Editor Rape isn't polite. We don't talk about rape. We hear about sexual assault in the news, but we still like to think rape happens to other people in other communities. Rape remains a silent crime in our com-munity and throughout Texas.

Governor Rick Perry has designated and Attorney General John Cornyn supports April as Sexual Assault Awareness Month. Hale County Crisis Center is committed to advocacy, prevention, recovery and education concerning sexual

The majority of rapes are committed against minors, and most rapes occur in a home, not in a dark alley, as many believe. Rapists choose victims who are vulnerable Because we doubt the validity of victims' experiences, rape is the least reported of all crimes. Victims hide this secret because we blame them. They are afraid they will not be believed and supported. That is why less than 15 percent of rapes are reported to authorities.

The wounds of sexual assault are usually not apparent on the outside, but they can be profound emotional wounds. Life may never be the same for sexual assault victims, whether the rapist was a stranger, date, acquaintance, or family member. Thirteen percent of rape vic-

tims even attempt suicide. Hale County Crisis Center sees not only the damage done to survivors, but to those who care about them. As a community, we are damaging ourselves by not talking about We continue to place our most vulnerable residents at risk by not supporting victims and not holding

perpetrators accountable.

Let us pause and ask ourselves how we can work together to reduce sexual assault and respond to survivors of this violence in a way that enables them to heal and regain control in their lives. And let us commit to face the reality that rape lives in our own backyards

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

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Texas Planting Projections Down Says TASS

Lubbock, March 30, 2001 By: Shawn Wade
The Texas Agriculture Statistics Service (TASS) released its projections for 2001-crop Upland Cotton plantings today and the news
for Texas is less acreage, not more as many had forecast.
U.S. acreage was projected to increase less than one percent over
2000-crop plantings. All cotton plantings were projected at 15.6 million acres with Upland cotton projected at just under 15.4 million

acres
This was apparently seen as good news from a market standpoint and future prices were up significantly shortly after the release. Most industry estimates for plantings had been significantly higher than the USDA number averaging 16.1 million acres.
The main reason for fewer acres in Texas were increased costs for irrigation and fertilizer and continued projections for low prices in 2001.

Up to a quarter of an irrigated producers expense is tied to fueling irrigation systems and projections that irrigation expenses in the Texas High Plains could be double that amount in 2001, many crop growers have decided to look elsewhere to find crops with breakeven

potential

That combined with input costs also being driven up by high energy prices have made decisions on what to do in 2001 hard to make.

Foot and Mouth Disease

Animal health officials in Texas are watching with concern the re-lentless westward march of foot-and-mouth disease(FMD). The most recent outbreak of which was confirmed in late February at several sites in England in cattle. Additional cases of FMD have been de-tected among cattle, sheep, and swine in great Britain. FMD, which has not been seen in the U.S. since 1929, is caused by a highly infectious virus that can cause death or disabling blisters.

In our Senior Citizens Exercise class this week, we discussed arthritis. Arthritis is the most common disease affecting humans. Over 40 million people, including 400,000 children, suffer from joint disorders in the U.S. Joint disorders strike at the heart of indepen-

Over 40 million people, including 400,000 children, suffer from joint disorders in the U.S. Joint disorders strike at the heart of independence-the ability to move freely. Although there is no cure for arthritis, the symptoms can be controlled.

Warning signs of arthritis include: pain in or around the joints, stiffness in or around joints, swelling in or around joints, problems moving a joint through its free range of motion, loss of muscle around joints, development of nodules for bone around joints, fatigue and loss of appetite, and aching during inclement weather.

There are over 100 illnesses that fall under the category of arthritis. Four of the most common types are: 1) Rheumatoid Arthritis- a chronic inflammatory disorder that causes pain, stiffness, and deformation in the joints, 2) Osteoarthritis- degenerative joint disease in which the breakdown of joint tissue leads to joint pain, morning stiffness and changes in the joints, 3) Juvenile Rheumatoid Arthritis-rheumatoid arthritis that affects children, 4) Gout-caused by a buildup of uric acid in the body.

Exercise for arthritis depends on the type of arthritis. Three forms of exercise may be beneficial range of motion exercises maintain flexibility, reduce pain and stiffness, and improve joint function, muscle strengthening exercises provide support for the joints, endurance exercises, such as walking, sustain muscle strength over a length of time; and exercise works best if done after a warm bath or after use of a heating pad. Crop Texas Weather Report

Lush forage is causing bloat and some death in Texas cattle Bloating has been a problem in the South Plains and has been in creasing as weather improves and forage becomes lush. Bloat occurs when forage begins to grow after being dormant all winter. High soil moisture will cause increased growth and add to bloating probgrowth and add to bloating problems. The only way to completely
prevent bloat is to take the cattle
off pasture. If producers do that,
then they will have to spend money maintaining cattle in a different program. The incidence of
theses problems lessens as forage
matures and protein content decreases. It's always wise not to
turn hungry cattle into a fresh
pasture, because there is more of a asture, because there is more of a chance of bloat.

Last Year's Dry Fall May Pose Problems for Wheat

This year's wheat crop got off to a rocky start due to a dry fall in the Texas Panhandle. Wheat planted in November or later did fully emerge until mid-Janu-Dryland and irrigated wheat yield potential will decrease when planted after October. Research showed that Dryland wheat planted in October yielded an average of 39 bushels an acre compared to wheat planted in November that yielded 26 bushels. Wheat planted late does not have the benefit of producing tillers in the fall, which are critical to achieve acceptable grain levels. Moisture is another factor that impacts wheat. Ever when soil moisture is good, a late-planted crop will not set roots deeply enough to take advantage of it.


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
