## Turkey, Quitaque Area Voters Split Amendment Vote

VOTERS in Turkey went FOR all but two of the Amendments -- in a big way -- in Tuesday's Constitutional Amendment election, while in Quitaque, the vote was split down the middle -- five carried, five were defeated.  
Sixty-one voters went to the polls in Turkey, and in Quitaque, fifty-one cast their vote.

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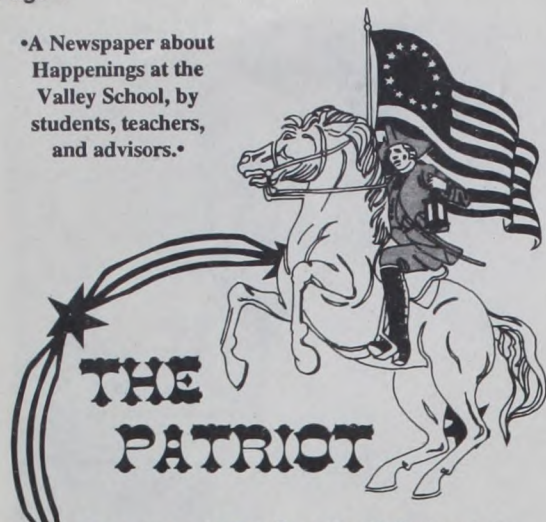
