Turkey, Quitaque **Area Voters Split Amendment Vote**

VOTERS in Turkey went FOR all but two of the Amendments -- in a big way -- in Tuesday's Constitutional Amendment election, while in Quitaque, the vote was split down the middle -- five carried, five were defeated.

Sixty-one voters went to the polls in Turkey, and in Quitaque, fiftyone cast their vote. Here is how the two sister cities

These people moved the world, and so can we all. Few will have the greatness to bend history itself, but each of us can work to change a small portion of events, and in the total of all those acts will be written the history of this generation.

It is from numberless diverse acts of courage and belief that human history is shaped. Each time a person stands up for an ideal, or acts to improve the lot of others, or strikes out against injustice, he or she sends forth a tiny ripple of hope, and crossing each other from a million different centers of energy and daring, those ripples build a current that can sweep down the mightiest walls of oppression and resistance. (These words were spoken in 1966 by Robert Kennedy to a group of young people in South Africa.)

They are just as true today as when they were spoken. As Thomas Carlyle once said "When the oak is felled the whole forest echoes with its fall, but a hundred acorns are sown in silence by an "We may be the unnoticed acorns but just think unnoticed breeze. of the rewards that can possibly be ours by standing up for our ideals regardless of the cost.
