The following morning, the riders will travel down to Caprock Canyons State Park, arriving about 4 p.m. At the trail's end supper on May 24, there will be a ceremony recognizing those who traveled the greatest distance to attend, those responsible for raising the most money for the head injury fund and other awards. wheels rolling by calling Bill Sarpalius' office, and under pretense of a "Love Bob Day" arrangements were made for a special ceremony at


the Chaney home. An Honor Guard composed of

The special sword was awarded for Chaney's service during World War II, where he received four Battle Stars, serving in the Soloman, New Hebrides, and Tonga Islands; Guadalcanal, Australia, and New Zealand, (where Chaney said the 30,000 Marines stationed there "ate all the sheep on the is-land.") He also fought in the Mariannas Islands, Guam, and Saipan, and on Iwo Jima. He was presented with a replica of the purple heart decoration, which had

been earned but never presented before his discharge in Norfolk, VA in October of 1945. Chaney later said "When I saw Citizens meeting. Margie Pinkerton took blood pressure tests. Buster Hanna, up my road, I didn't know what was

going to happen to me!" As he was approached by Major Cook, Chaney said "If you've come to recruit me, you've waited a few years too late." Following the presentation by Cook, Officer of the Day represent-

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
