Successful Migrant Program Recognized At Valley School

Turkey-Quitaque C.I.S.D. has been recognized by the Texas Education Agency for successfully educating its migrant students.

TEA's Division of Migrant Education has selected Turkey-Quitaque (Valley School) as a winner of the 2001-2002 District and Excelling Campus Awards given to school districts and campuses that achieved academic success with their migrant students. Statewide, 121 school districts and 583 campuses are receiving this recognition.

The purpose of the awards are to recognize school districts and campuses that strive to meet the unique needs of migrant children and their families and help migrant students to meet high academic standards. There are approximately 126,000 migrant children in Texas.

In order to receive the district award, school district had to attain a migrant student passing rate of at least 80 percent in each subject area (Reading, Writing and Mathematics) in Spring 2001 Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS), and have a migrant student dropout rate of 5.5 percent or less. The 121 district winners were divided in four categories based on the number of migrant students enrolled.

Campus winners were ranked within the four categories of Exceptional, Excelling, Promising and Acknowledged based upon migrant student performance on the TAAS and migrant student dropout rate. State wide, 48 campuses were designated as Excelling, 188 campuses as Promising and 172 campuses as Acknowledged. Valley School campus was selected as an Excelling Campus. This determination was based on 10 or more migrant students taking at least 1 TAAS Test (Reading, Writing and Mathematics). A passing rate of at least 80% in each subject area on the Spring 2001 TAAS and a migrant dropout rate of 3% or less.

Each year the Migrant Conference Planning Committee discusses and selects the criteria for district and campus awards. The committee includes state, regional and district migrant educators.

The Quitaque City Council met for their monthly meeting on Monday, January 14, 2002. Mayor Roland Hamilton called the meeting to order with council members Janice Henson, Randy Stark, Phil Barefield, Rhonda Farner and City Manager Maria Cruz present. Council member Arnold Castillo was absent.

Minutes of the December meeting were read and approved. Under public comment the council was informed that no word had been received from the Community Center Grant or the Park Improvement Grant. The council was also informed that the new pickup for the city should be in within the next week or two.

In other business the Library report was read and approved. According to the monthly Fire Department report there had been no fires reported since the last meeting. One run was reported by the Ambulance Service since last regular meeting. Maria reported the service has scheduled an EMT class to begin January 29, 2002 for the cities of Quitaque, Turkey and Silverton and anyone else interested in continuing education hours and recertification hours. The council was informed that the new radios for unit 1 and 2 are in and will be installed sometime this month. The new computer provided by Panhandle Emergency Medical Services is in and is being uploaded with the new hardware. The ambulance service would be able to put this computer to use very soon.

The council was given an update on the progress at the sewer plant. All work is on schedule.

Next the council reviewed delinquent water bills then after a review of the city's monthly bills a motion to adjourn was made and seconded.

Hall County Sheriff's Department Complies With Senate Bill 1047 On Racial Profiling

Hall County Sheriff, Robert McGuire recently stated, "This department supports the 77th Texas Legislature's mandate prohibiting racial profiling in Texas. Our deputies work under a departmental policy that is consistent with all state and federal laws." This policy includes provisions for citizens to contact the Sheriff's Department if they have a conflict with a Hall County deputy.

McGuire went on to say that his department realizes that there will be disagreements, from time to time, with individuals that come in contact with his officers. "We realize that confusion, different perceptions or possibly the timeliness of information could result in information that may produce different accounts of the same incident," he said. "These disagreements between citizens and officers need to be addressed. We trust that the vast majority of contacts between citizens and officers are conducted in a positive, professional manner. The relationship between the community and our officers is based on confidence and trust. We cannot be effective without both the community and our officers working together to achieve this goal."

Citizens feeling that they have a legitimate concern may make a formal complaint to the Hall County Sheriff's Department at any time by contacting any member of this department for information on the complaint process. Additional information about this process may be obtained by calling 806-259-2151.

The Hall County Sheriff's Department would also like to know about positive police contacts. Please write the Sheriff a letter or note to let him know about a positive contact with Hall County officers. Sheriff McGuire will let the officer know about the letter and a copy will be placed in the officer's personnel folder.

McGuire concluded by saying, "We are very proud of the relationship the Hall County Sheriff's Department shares with the community. Our long-standing goal is to provide our citizens with a safe community where all may live without the fear of crime."

 I am enclosing an article taken from the December 2001 "Texas Highways".

The last article in on Curtis Tunnell. Curtis was a 1951 graduate of Turkey High School, a classmate of Harold Wheeler and Homer Hawkins, among others who may still live in the area or receive the Valley paper.

He and his family will be remembered by a large number of your readers.

When Curtis was in high school he explored much of the area surrounding Turkey, often finding arrowheads and other artifacts. He knew a place where he could gather "quartz roses", some of which he shared with my mother. I'm not sure he ever disclosed the location of those unusual finds.

Curtis and I attended West Texas State University (now WTAMU) at the same time. He was a junior when I entered as a freshman in the fall of 1953. We both worked at the Panhandle Plains Museum on campus. I worked in reception and Curtis worked as an assistant to Dr. Hughes, who was the paleontologist for the museum. One of their projects at the time was reconstructing a "Saber Tooth Tiger".

Two years ago, while visiting the Texas Maritime Museum in Rockport, Texas, I watched a film about the excavation of LaSalle's LaBelle and to my surprise and delight, there at the end of the film was Curtis, commenting on the excavation project.

The State of Texas and its "antiquities" lost a real friend with the passing of Curtis Tunnell.

It is nice to know he was appreciated in his adopted hometown, Austin.

Archeology Pioneer
 Curtis Tunnell, the first state archeologist with the Texas Historical Commission in 1965, died April 13 at his home in Austin. Named executive director of the Texas Historical Commission in 1981, he remained in that position until his retirement in 1999. He spent his last two years volunteering at the THC's fort St Louis archeological site near Victoria.

He also frequented music venues around Austin, where he was known as an accomplished two-stepper. One of Tunnell's favorite projects was the excavation of LaSalle's LaBelle shipwreck in Matagorda Bay. He also worked to develop the Texas Antiquities Code, which protects historic artifacts, and to increase funding for historic restoration projects around the state.

The Valley Patriots used a strong fourth quarter to blow open a close game before defeating the Chillicothe Eagles 78-64 Tuesday night. The Patriots scored 25 points in the final quarter after scoring 27 in the second quarter.

On a night when all ten players scored, Robert Valdes led the Patriots in scoring with 18. Wes Henson scored 15 points before leaving midway through the second quarter with an ankle injury.

Robert Valdes had 12 points in the second quarter as he hit 5 three-pointers before halftime. Cliff Yeary and Adam Ortiz each had big nights as they scored 10 points apiece and grabbed 6 and 5 offensive rebounds respectively.

Derrick Cruse led the team with 8 rebounds and also chipped in 8 points. Douglas Payne scored 9 points.

"This was a solid team effort," Coach Clay said. "Justin Wilks, Christopher Taylor, and Ramiro Ramos were all tough inside after Wes went out. Cliff and Adam really stepped up tonight, and Chase handled the ball well."

This was the team's second victory since last semester. The Patriots beat Sands 66-50 in December as Cruse scored 29 and Valdes scored 19. Valley will begin their tough district schedule tomorrow at Silverton.

As Search Continues For Coca-Cola Scholars, Amber Stark Is Picked As Semifinalist

Amber Stark, a Valley High senior, has been selected from over 91,000 applicants nationwide as a semifinalist in the 2001-2002 Coca-Cola Scholars Program.

She ranks with over 2,000 seniors who are in the running for \$1.8 million in college scholarships being awarded by the Coca-Cola Scholars Foundation. Students are selected to advance to this next phase based on the level of excellence, leadership and achievement demonstrated in school and community activities. 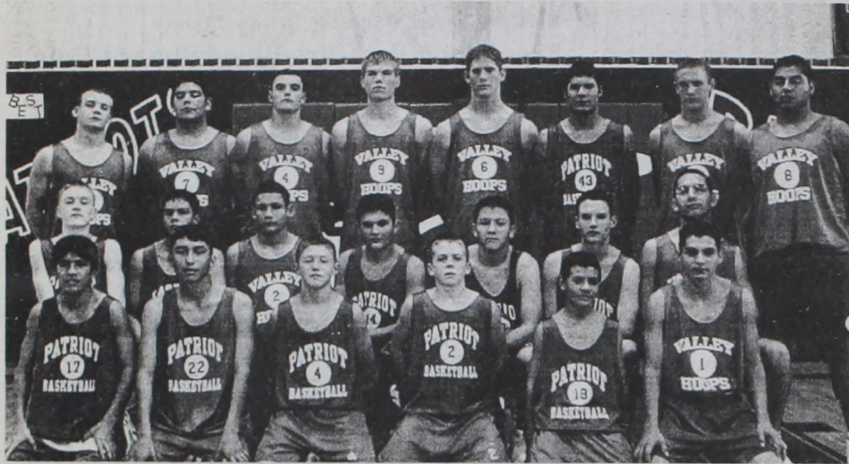

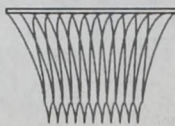
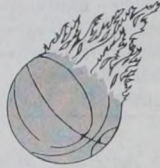
