Hall County Sheriff's Department Complies With Senate Bill 1047 On Racial Profiling

Hall County Sheriff, Robert McGuire recently stated, 'This department supports the 77th Texas Legislature's mandate prohibiting racial profiling in Texas. Our deputies work under a departmental policy that is consistent with all state and federal laws." This policy includes provisions for citizens to contact the Sheriff's Department if they have a conflict with a Hall County deputy

McGuire went on to say that his department realizes that there will be disagreements, from time to time, with individuals that come in contact with his officers. "We realize that confusion, different perceptions or possibly the timeliness of information could result in information that may produce different accounts of the same incident." he said. "These disagreements between citizens and officers need to be addressed. We trust that the vast majority of contacts between citizens and officers are conducted in a positive, professional manner. The relationship between the community and our officers is based on confidence and trust. We cannot be effective without both the community and our officers working together to achieve this goal."

Citizens feeling that they have a legitimate concern may make a formal complaint to the Hall County Sheriff's Department at any time by contacting any member of this department for information on the complaint process. Additional information about this process may be obtained by calling 806-259-2151.

The Hall County Sheriff's Department would also like to know about positive police contacts. Please write the Sheriff a letter or note to let him know about a positive contact wit Hall County officers. Sheriff McGuire will let the officer know about the letter and a copy will be placed in the officer's personnel folder

McGuire concluded by saying, "We are very proud of the relationship the Hall County Sheriff's Department shares with the community. Our long-standing goal is to provide our citizens with a safe community where all may live without the fear of crime."

Successful Migrant Program Recognized At Valley School

Turkey-Quitaque C.I.S.D. has been recognized by the Texas Education Agency for successfully educating its migrant students.

TEA's Division of Migrant Education has selected Thrkey-Quitaque (Valley School) as a winner of the 2001-2002 District and Excelling Campus Awards given to school districts and campuses that achieved academic success with their migrant students. Statewide, 121 school districts and 583 campuses are receiving this recognition.

The purpose of the awards are to recognize school districts and campuses that strive to meet the unique needs of migrant children and their families and help migrant students to meet high academic standards. There are approximately 126,000 migrant children in Exas.

In order to receive the district award, school district had to attain a migrant student passing rate of at least 80 percent in each subject area (Reading, Writing and Mathematics) in Spring 2001 Exas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS), and have a migrant student dropout rate of 5.5 percent or less. The 121 district winners were divided in four categories based on the number of migrant students enrolled.

Campus winners were ranked within the four categories of Exceptional, Excelling, Promising and Acknowledged based upon migrant student performance on the TAAS and migrant student dropout rate. State wide, 48 campuses were designated as Excelling, 188 campuses as Promising and 172 campuses as Acknowledged. Valley School campus was selected as an Excelling Campus. This determination was based on 10 or more migrant students taking at least 1 TAAS Test (Reading, Writing and Mathematics). A passing rate of at least 80% in each subject area on the Spring 2001 TAAS and a migrant dropout rate of 3% or less.

Each year the Migrant Conference Planning Committee discusses and selects the criteria for district and campus awards. The committee includes state, regional and district migrant educators.

Curtis and I attended West Texas State University (now WTAMU) at the same time. He was man in the fall of 1953. We both worked at the Panhandle Plains Museum on campus. I worked in reception and Curtis worked as an assistant to Dr. Hughes, who was the paleontologist for the museum. One of their projects at the time was reconstructing a "Saber Tooth Ti-

Two years age, while visiting the Texas Maritime Museum in Rockport, Texas, I watched a film about the excavation of Lasalle's LaBelle and to my surprise and delight, there at the end of the film was Curtis, commenting on the ex

The State of Texas and its "antiqui-ties" lost a real friend with the passing of Curtis Tunnell.

Archeology Pioneer

Curtis Tunnell, the first state ar-cheologist with the Texas Historical Commission in 1965, died April 13 at his home in Austin. Named ex cutive director of the Texas Histori cal Commission in 1981, he re mained in that position until his retiremnt in 1999. He spent his last two years volunteering at the THC's fort St louis archelolgical site near

He also frequented music venues around Autin, where he was known as an accomplished two-steeper.
One of Tunnell's favorite projects was the excavatin of LaSalle's LaBelle shipwreck in matagorda Bay. He also worked to develop the Texas Antiquities Code, which protects historic artifacts, and to increase funding for historic restoration projects around the state.



"Cell phones are a wonderful tool for our clients," says Kay Harris, director of Hale County Crisis Center, which serves Hale, Floyd, Swisher, Briscoe, Motley, Hall, Castro and Lamb counties.

"They can have them close by and, when threatened, call 911 im-

Isolation in rural communities is the main factor in continued domestic violence. Victims are safe in our house, but once they leave it, they are vulnerable," Mrs. Harris says. "I know of one client whose husband removed the phones from their farmhouse when he left as well as the car keys in order to isolate his wife from help. Particularly in instances

like this, a cell phone gives them an avenue of keeping in touch."

With that light of hope, the sad fact is that many victims of domestic abuse don't have the means to buy and maintain cell phone service.

That's where Nelda Laney, first lady of the Texas House of Repre-

sentatives, comes in After a successful drive in Austin led by Legislative Wives and other entities that netted more than 10,000 cell phones for crisis centers in the Austin area, she has joined with the Covenant School of Nursing in Lubbock to provide cell phones for victims of domestic violence.

Businesses and organizations involved in the project include Motorola, The Wireless Foundation, Cingular and Cell Tone (Gary Thurman and Don Henderson of Plainview), as well as Covenant School

Nursing, the Women's Protective Service of Lubbock and hale County "All types and Brand of cell phones, working or non-working, can be donated," explains Mrs. Laney. "All will be sent to a Motorola factory

in Minnesota where they are stripped and refurbished."

When the phones are stripped of information and repaired, they will be returned to the South Plains where, locally, they will be activated with two numbers, the universal 911 emergency number, and non-emergency local number: Gary Thurman and Don Henderson of Cell Tone, have donated air time and programming to the project.

Mrs. laney also explains that all types and brands of cell phones can be donated, reiterating that all information is stripped from the do-

nated phones before they are reassigned.
"Many people ask if their numbers or accounts can be stolen," she says. "We can assure them that they cannot be I describe it as gutting the phone and starting over. They use broken phones and those without batteries or parts to repair the working phones, then when they are shipped back to us, two numbers are activated. The goal of the program is to provide safety, not a cell phone for normal use. The person receiving the phone will have access to only two numbers, 911, and one assigned locally, probably the Hale County Crisis line."

Local collection point is the newspaper office.

Mrs. laney also encourages civic clubs and organizations, churches,
4-H and other youth groups and businesses to collect phones for the drive.

Deadline for the South Plains drive is January, 31, 2002.

Hale County Crisis Center served 1,365 victims of domestic abuse

last year, adding up to 3,433 shelter days, which is the number of days clients stayed in the safe house.

According to a Lubbock editorial, the Women's Protective Services in Lubbock serves 130 women and children who stay at their shelter, plus 60 to 70 more who reside elsewhere. In addition WPS takes in 50 to 70







LUBBOCK, January 11, 2002 The cotton industry's annual gathering to exchange information, catch up on the latest technology and predict the future is underway in Alanta,

Georgia this week The 2002 Beltwide Cotton Conferences have once again proven to be a focal point for the industry and the setting for memorable comments. This year's "call to arm" was issued by Anderson D. Warlick, CEO of Parkdale Mills, Gastonia, North Carolina. Scheduled to discuss the 2002

U.S. Textile Outlook, Warlick announced at the start that he wasn't really going to talk about that particular topic. Instead he announced the revised title of his talk as "Free Trade: What

As the title implied, Warlick emphasized the terrible price the U.S. textile industry has been paying over the past year. That price, in his view, has primarily been the result of the hand-tying trade concessions and U.S. policy positions that have hampered the industries ability to

compete on the so-called level playing field that has been promised. He noted that something needs to change and a bleak future could be in the offing should the course not be altered.

Warlick noted that three years ago the domestic consumption was an

impressive 11 million bales. He then contrasted that the situation today where consumption has dropped to 7.5 million bales and voiced the possibility that the number could drop even further unless something

Another high point was the annual speech by William B. Dunavant, Jr., Dunavant Enterprises, Memphis, Tennessee Dunavant's comments provided an expectant crowd the very news they hoped he wouldn't pro-vide- U.S. cotton prices are expected to stay near current trading range

and have little or no opportunity to eclipse the 40 cent level in 2002. Dunavant noted that cotton producers and textiles have been hardest hit as they have been on the frontlines of the current economic malaise

he encouraged all allied industry representatives to support the producer during the ongoing Farm Bill debate and noted that the U.S. government must continue to provide that type of support.

He noted, however, that both House and Senate proposals were doing exactly the opposite of what they needed to do despite the real needs that exist for the support. He explained that he felt the Bill's encourage overproduction and provide the U.S. grower and the world the wrong

On the technical side he noted that his forecasts indicate that the 45 million bales of cotton that comprise world carryover stocks will likely drop somewhat to 42.7 million by the end of the marketing year. He added that this drop is expected to occur despite the fact that U.S. stocks could climb to 9 million bales from the current 2001 U.S. carryover projection of 8.7 million bales.

He described a situation where enhanced U.S. export opportunities will be the key to offsetting the decline in domestic consumption expected in

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted In Briscoe County

Applications for emergency farm loans for loss treme amounts of rain, flash flooding, flooding, high winds, hail, lightning, and a tornado, that occurred on June 1, 3, and 5, 2001 are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Tulia, according to Ross W. James.

Swisher and Briscoe counties are two of eight in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Ann M. Veneman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the extreme amount of rain, flash flooding, flooding, high winds, hail, lightning, and a tornado.

FSA announced farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 per

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," James said. Farmers participating in the federal crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 13, 2002 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in process-

ing and possibly over into the new farming season.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest. UNGLUED

Winter Sprinkling Means Slippery Streets






