Land Diversion

Payments Total

Briscoe County farmers parti-cipating in the 1985 wheat and

upland cotton programs received approximately \$940,000.00 for the paid diversion portion of their total acreage conservation reserve requirements. The land

diversion payments compensate farmers for taking additional cropland out of production after

meeting regular acreage reduc-tion requirements.

Designed to control excess

crop supplies and maintain a level of stocks in line with market demand, the 1985 pro-

grams authorized a 20 percent

acreage reduction with a 10 percent paid land diversion for wheat and upland cotton. The

paid diversion resulted in a total reduction of 11,000 acres of the

eligible wheat and upland cotton

diversion payments were computed by multiplying the payment rate times the farm yield times the acres diverted. Program participants were eligible to receive half of their payments when they signed up and the balance after reporting their 1985 crop acreages.

In addition to land diversion payments, farmers who comply

with program provisions will be eligible for target price protec-tion, price support loans and other program benefits. Based on the enrollment re-port, Briscoe County farmers diverted 3,000 expect of propland

diverted 33,000 acres of cropland from production to the acreage

conservation reserve through the 1985 acreage reduction and land diversion programs.

of arrangement, you are under no obligation to return the merchandise, to pay for it, or give it any special care. Any such merchan-dise sent C.O.D. through the mail is a postal violation and should be immediately reported to your post office.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration is spon-soring All-American Buckle-Up, using the theme, "Start a Habit for Life." Residents of the Silverton community are challenged to join the All-American Buckle-Up. Through the cooperative efforts of people like you, and hundreds of organizations nationwide, this is a perfect time to "Start a Habit for Life."

Area law enforcement officers began "vigorous enforcement" of the state's seat belt law Decemthe state's seat belt law December 1. They will be pulling over people who aren't wearing their belts and ticketing them. Officers have been issuing warning citations when they noticed people weren't wearing seat belts while committing other infractions. Or all warnings have been given by al warnings have been given by most officers.

That changed December 1.
Violating the ordinance is a Class
C misdemeanor, like most traffic
violations, and it carries a fine of
fine of between \$25 and \$50.

Statistics show that wearing seat belts saves lives. It is estimated that 70 to 80 percent of Texas drivers are complying with the new law.

with the new law.

One major problem in the predominantly rural areas is the single-car accident, which comprises about 44 percent of the area's accidents. Many deaths in such accidents occur when people are thrown from their cars, which wouldn't happen if they were wearing seat belts. In the summer of 1984, state legislators in New York took a bold step toward reducing the number of persons killed and injured in motor vehicle crashes. They enacted a mandatory safety

They enacted a mandatory safety belt use law, making the Empire State the first in the nation to

have such a law. New York acted with good reason: motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of violent death for persons between the ages of six and fifty. Safety belts are 40 to 50 percent effective in are 40 to 50 percent effective in preventing fatalities and 45 to 55 percent effective in reducing serious injuries. Many European countries have had such laws on the books for years and have proven that belt laws save lives and reduce crippling injuries.

Despite the overwhelming evidence of safety helt effective.

Despite the overwhelming evidence of safety belt effectiveness, there have been only modest increases in their use. Belts are available in almost every motor vehicle on the road today, and have been for some time. But most motorists do not cassider the mealvast to be at risk

consider themselves to be at risk in a car and don't use them. Meanwhile, the tragic carnage on our roads continues. In 1984, there were 44,241 traffic fatalities in this country and more than 3½ million injuries. More than two-thirds of those killed were occupants of motor ve-hicles. Most of the deaths and

injuries were preventable.

The New York law has an impressive record. A survey in New York in October 1984, before that state's safety belt law

went into effect, showed only a 16 percent usage rate by drivers and their front seat passengers. In March of 1985, after the law had been in effect only three months, the use rate jumped to around 60 percent.

More important, the state reported an 18 percent decline in

occupant fatalities during the first six months the new law was in effect when compared to the same period in 1984.

As of September 1985, 13 other states, including Texas, have enacted safety belt laws. Many other states will consider similar action during their 1986

similar action during their 1986 legislative sessions.

Most of the opposition to such laws has come from individuals and groups who raise the question of infringement on personal freedoms. The mandatory use laws, they argue, are a classic illustration of government intrusion. Legislators believe that the issue of personal freedom does issue of personal freedom does not apply. The states have always exercised powers relating to the health and safety of their citizens, including the regulation of motor vehicle operation. The usual Constitutional test of any law is not whether it imposes restraints on individual behavior, but whether those restraints achieve a public benefit. In short, a driver's freedom of

choice must be balanced against the rights of other people—the right, for example, not to be burdened by the over \$65 billion annual social cost of motor vehicle accidents, injuries and deaths. The fact is, when a motor

vehicle crash occurs, all pay.

If you could argue the point of government intrusion, you would also logically support the repeal of most public health and safety laws, such as required immuniza-tions and health standards for restaurants.

restaurants.

The human costs of motor vehicle crashes are especially tragic. Motor vehicle fatalities are never expected events. When they happen, they not only shatter individual lives but leave behind a legacy of emotional and financial hardship for the next of kin to endure. There are also hundreds of thousands of accident victims who never fully dent victims who never fully recover from their injuries. Many of them become parapleg-ies, quadraplegies or epileptics. Safety belts offer the best

Safety belts offer the best hope to reduce these enormous human and economic costs immediately. It has been estimated that if all front seat occupants in passenger cars who do not use their belts now buckled their belts, between 8,000 and 10,000 fatalities a year could be prevented and serious injuries could be reduced by more than 135,000 each year.

That's reason enough for each person to buckle up on every trip—even the shortest ones. Accept the challenge. Buckle

your safety belt every time you get into an automobile and "Start a Habit for Life."

Colorful Christmas **Ornaments**

Buy two, three or more colors of 9"x 12" felt pieces.
Cut thin cardboard into teardrop shapes, or round

Spread Elmer's Dib 'N Dab adhesive on one side of the cardboard. Cover the glued cardboard with felt fabric. Do the reverse side the same. Now place the ornament between two pieces of clean pa-per and weight it down for

an hour or two.

Plan and cut designs of contrasting felt, ribbons,

lace, sequins, beads, etc. for each ornament. Place the designs on the felt be-fore gluing, to see the effect

Attach small gems to your ornaments by holding them with tweezers and gently dip-ping the section to be attached into the glue. Remove the excess glue with wet cotton swabs.

Finish the ornament by gluing a ruffle, a gold braid, or other pretty trim around its edges. Punch a hole in the top of the ornament. Insert a piece of yarn or a ribbon into the punched hole for hanging.

These make beautiful gifts name tags by writing the name of the receiver on the back of the teardrop.

After the 24 hours, cut the stems straight across and seal the water in by dipping the stems in candle wax. Rub or dip the broadleafed evergreens with a liquid, self-polishing floor wax. This coating forms a vapor barrier that will help to slow evaporation. The to slow evaporation. The wax will also help to keep berries of nandina, pyracantha or holly more securely on their twigs.

For a pretty little tree to use as a table's centerpiece, cut a large piece of paper into a half circle, making it two times longer than it is wide. Roll this circle into a cone and tape the cone together. Trim the base of the

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
