She was accorded the univer-sity's highest honor during Way-land's annual Citizenship Chapel ind in Harral Memorial Auditorium. The 1986 winner was announced by Dr. Paul Butler, student development vice president. Voted upon annually by the Wayland student body and facul-

Wayiana student body and iacul-ty, the Female Citizen of the Year award goes to the senior woman who best exemplifies Christian attitudes, a commend-able academic record, diversity of interests, loyalty to American ideals, personal integrity and the Wayland spirit.
