## ISE Seeking Host Families

International Student Exchange is seeking host families for foreign exchange students soon to be arriving for the second semester (January) programs.  
 ISE is a designated United States Information Agency program and is listed by the Council on Standards for International Educational Travel, certifying that ISE complies with the standards set forth for International Educational Travel Programs.

ISE is presently seeking host families for students from a number of different countries. Students between the ages of 15 and 18 are carefully screened by ISE for suitability. They bring their own spending money and are covered by health insurance. These students speak English and are anxious to share their native culture with an American family.

ISE's Area Representatives assist prospective host families in the selection of a student who best matches each host family's interests and lifestyle. Students are selected from student applications which include family photos and biographical essays. As there are no "typical" host families, ISE places students with large and small families, single parents, single persons and retired couples. ## Irrigation Conference

Growers constantly are looking for ways to improve profitability. New technology and improving irrigation methods determine the up or down side of any operations, says Leon New, irrigation specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and co-organizer of the High Plains irrigation conference and trade show scheduled at the Amarillo Civic Center, Third and Buchanan, Jan. 10.

The conference program is designed to present timely information on irrigation and chemigation systems, including sessions addressing efficiency, management, safety, water quality, and complimentary equipment. This year, the Texas Agricultural Irrigation Association also holds its meeting in conjunction with the Amarillo conference. New is the current TAAIA state president.

"While the objectives of the annual event don't change, we do try and offer growers the very latest information involving agricultural research, equipment design, efficiency and service," New said.

Registration, trade show and hot coffee open the event at 8:25 a.m. Conference moderators will include Extension Service agents Dennis Newton of Deaf Smith, Danny Nusser, Gray County, Robert Harris, in Moore and Jim Allison, currently in Sherman County, but who will shortly become the agricultural agent in Potter County. The program will run from 9:25 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. There will be a registration fee that will also pay for lunch.

Texas Department of Agriculture has approved this meeting for three continuing education units. It's being offered to private, commercial and non-commercial applicators at the completion of the program. Applicators are required to obtain five CEUs of training each year to retain certification.

Tom Marek, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and research leader at the North Plains Research Field Station at Etter will address proper irrigation well design and construction. Wells drilled today must not only produce optimum water and sustain productivity, but protect the pump.

Jerry White will focus his presentation on boll weevil control with chemigation.

"The boll weevil problem is here," said White, a senior agricultural specialist with Rhone-Poulenc Chemical from Canyon, whose presentation will address ways to limit or deter potential weevil damage, economically.

The wrap-up session for completing required paperwork for anyone needing CEUs will begin at 4 p.m. Contact Leon New at (806) 359-5401 or your local county Extension Service office for more information.

## Texas Dept. Of Public Safety

The Department of Public Safety has issued approximately 1,200 concealed licenses which will become valid Jan. 1.

The DPS has received more than 170,000 requests for applications and has mailed more than 153,000 application forms in response. Texas citizens have filled out and returned more than 35,000 applications.

The Concealed Handgun Unit has reviewed all applications received in September and some of those received in October. All September applicants have been mailed their licenses or have been sent notices of problems such as smudged fingerprint cards, incomplete application packets or questions about potential disqualifying factors.

"We've dedicated a lot of resources to initiating the licensing process, and it is running very smoothly," said Frankie L. Waller, Chief of Administration for DPS. "The public response has been tremendous. However, due to the enormous response and the short startup period, we do anticipate taking the full 90 days to process applications."

"I know all applicants are eagerly awaiting their licenses and are tempted to call and ask for their status, but each time the phone rings it takes our personnel away from the license issuance process and slows things down," Waller said. "We ask your patience in giving us ample time to process your application before calling to check on its status."

January had .29 inch; February 2.06; March .66; April 1.54; May 6.47; June 2.52; July 2.24; August 5.65; September 6.70; October 1.91; November 0; and December .80, for a total of 27.84 inches in 1995.

## Texas Dept Of Public

Concealed handgun license holders who are stopped for traffic violations after Jan.-1 should let law enforcement officers know if they are carrying their weapons.

Department of Public Safety troopers will begin asking motorists whether they have concealed handgun licenses, whether they have their weapons with them and, if so, where the guns are located. Troopers will have the discretion to disarm license holders if they feel safety is at risk.

At the first opportunity, licensees should let officers know where their weapons are located. If asked for identification while carrying their handguns, they always must present their concealed handgun licenses along with their driver licenses or I.D. cards.

During traffic stops, citizens carrying guns should keep their hands in plain sight and cooperate fully with law enforcement officers to ensure everyone's safety.

License holders may begin legally carrying their concealed guns Jan. 1. As of today, approximately 1,200 licenses have been issued by the DPS. More than 170,000 people have requested application forms, and more than 35,000 have returned their completed application packet to the DPS.
