MINIMUM TILLAGE, STRIP CROPPING RECOMMENDED

According to David Seitz, minimum tillage and strip cropping are two of the methods recommended by conservationists to prevent wind erosion. Crop residues left on the soil surface will not only prevent the soil from blowing but will also reduce soil compaction, reduce formation of hard pans, improve soil aeration and moisture intake rates, and soil tilth.

mission recently announced

mission recently annotanced a quarantine order that reimposes restrictions on swine movements in Texas placed in effect March 29, to control hog cholera.

The new order became effective May 28, and it will remain in effect until further notice.

All previous restrictions on swine movements contained in the previous order will remain the same, with the exception of one additional restriction.

The new restriction order will require holding all purchased swine for 30 days at the premise of the purchaser, and no movement will be allowed except for slaughter during the quarantine. If swine are apparently healthy, this premise quarantine will automatically expire after the 30th day without any inspection.

It is strongly felt that extending quarantine control will bring Texalica.

First, you should be familiar with the store where you shop and brand names. Select stores and names with good reputations for

your meat shopping.

As you shop, be alert to packaging conditions. Reject a package that is broken, wet, bulging or appears to be under tension.

It's important to avoid exposing meat packages to warm air. Re-

Many bacteriologists say that Many bacteriologists say that, "Life begins at forty." By this, they mean 40° Fahrenheit. In fact, meat held at 40° Fahrenheit will keep twice as long as meat held at 50° Fahrenheit.

At even lower temperatures, such as 32° Fahrenheit, meat can be stored four times as long.

USDA Authorizes **Loans For Farm Storage Facilities**

Farm storage facility loans to fram storage rating and hay storage farm structures will be available effective July 1, 1971, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced today.

ture announced today.

Today's announcement removes a previous prohibition on loans for oxygen-free and silo-type structures. It also adds loans for hay storage which can be used by producers in conjunction with the Agricultural Act of 1970 provisions dealing with hay for emergency use. Regulations applying to current farm storage facility loans will generally be applicable to loans for hay storage.

USDA officials explained that changing conditions for harvesting, storing and feeding methods

ing, storing and feeding methods require greater use of on-farm structures capable of storing agricultural commodities containing a high percentage of moisture.

These changes become effective July 1, 1971.




