Shirttail Sermon

The text of our thinking today is Matthew 4:18-20, the story of Jesus' meeting with and calling Peter and his brother Andrew to be his disciples. From this story we learn many things. We will here consider three things.

First, God always chooses us before we choose Him. This is ex-

actly opposite to common belief which holds that we choose God first. This raises the question: why do we choose Him? There is something within Man that seeks God but which is difficult for Man to define. That "something" is the Holy Spirit moving our own spirit. God has chosen us.

Second, God does not choose us because we deserve it. Anyone who has ever lived around the docks of a seaport city knows that a fisherman is the least religious of men; yet these two fishermen were the first men chosen by Jesus to be disciples. They were rough in both appearance and talk and not the sort to teach

kindness, mercy, and tenderness but Jesus chose them to walk with Him.

Third, God does not choose us to be His favorites, but His servants. These two men were chosen by Jesus in order that He might teach them. They would then teach others as Jesus commanded them. Every Christian is a Son of God and does as God tells him even as an earthly son carries out the commands or requests of his earthly father.

Fourth, when God chooses and calls us, we also have to make our choice. Jesus did not force Peter and Andrew to follow Him; they chose to follow Him. Thus it is with every Christian: he is called, then he must make his choice. He can follow Jesus or he can turn his back on Him. The wise man asks himself this question: What have I chosen?

It's Strawberry Sauce

As a switch from strawberry shortcake, make a fresh strawberry sauce to serve over ice cream or sponge cake.

Fresh Strawberry Sauce

1 pint fresh strawberries
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1 tablespoon corn starch
1/2 cup water
Red food coloring, optional
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice

Wash and hull berries. Cut up enough to make 1/2 cup; mash, mix with sugar and then with corn syrup. Blend corn starch and water. Combine with mashed berries in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture is thickened and clear. Add a few drops food coloring, if desired. Cool. Cut about half the remaining berries in two. Sprinkle lemon juice over whole and halved berries; add to cooled mixture. Chill until serving time. Makes about 1 1/2 cups.

Ambrosia Pudding

2 cups cold milk
