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#### Scabies Quarantine Inspector Named

Gary L. Edwards, livestock in-spector with the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) at Turkey, Texas, has completed a training course in cattle scables identification. Edwards will be working in Hall County to help cattlemen move their livestock to market during the current cattle

scables quarantine.

The quarantine is aimed at halting the worst cattle scables outbreak to hit the nation since 1959. The eradication effort needs specially trained men like Edwards because the mites that cause the cattle scab are hard to spot The mites are often masked by pesticides used to kill ticks and

Edwards and the other in-spectors in the quarantine area are helping cattlemen identify in-fected animals and clean them of mites. If every head of infected and exposed cattle in the quaran-tine area is inspected and the af-fected animal is properly dipped for scables the quarantine can be lifted. are helping cattlemen identify in
