Rodeo Needs Another Mahan or Phil Lyne

Ft. Worth Star Telegram been the same since film producer Keith Merrill shot The Great American Cowboy in 1972. In his Oscarwinning documentary film, Merrill compares five-time Mahan and reigning all-around champion Phil Lyne. The film features Mahan

as the cowboy who grew up in a small town in Oregon and became the best bucking-stock rider of all time. In addition to his riding feats, interviews with Mahan featured his charismatic personality, his flamboyant style of dressing and his drive to win despite adverse circumstances.

Phil Lyne is portrayed as the champion cowboy who

came off a brushy ranch in Texas. He is filmed punching cattle into a loading chute, practicing roping in a roping arena competing at major-league

In the movie, Lyne is noted for his ability to master bucking stock and roping animals. Since Lyne semiretired after he won his second all-around title in 1972, no all-around champion has qualified for the National Finals Rodeo in a bucking stock event and a timed event at the same time.

Lyne's decision to return to the ranch closed an era of cowboys who were title

contenders in riding and Professional rodeo has not roping events. Every allaround titleholder since Lyne, including Mahan, who

won a record sixth all-around title in 1973, either qualified for the National Finals Rodeo in timed events or buckingstock events.

Great Cowboy features Mahan ambassador of rodeo. Since he retired in 1977, no one in professional rodeo has caught the attention of the general public like Mahan and no cowboy has mastered the three bucking-stock riding events -bareback riding, -bareback riding, brone riding and bull riding with the consistency Mahan. Today, Mahan, 44, has

shifted his focus from rodeo to competing in cutting horse events. He and his wife, Robin, live on a small ranch Texas, between Bandera and Kerrville.

Phil Lyne, 41, occasionally competes in calf roping and qualified for the National Finals in steer roping last year. He and his wife, Sarah, live on a cattle ranch near Cotulla, in South Texas.

Since Merrill award-winning film 15 years ago, no one has caught the public's eye like Mahan and no one has been as versatile as Lyne. In a day when primetime television captures most of the attention of today's youth, rodeo could use another





Recent discovery of duplicate military medical records by the National Archives will enable thousands of World War II and Korean Conflict Army and Army Air Corps veterans to file for Veterans Administration disability compensation payments. The discovery of computer tape of some 10 million Army medical records partially fill a gap created when a 1973 fire destroyed millions of mil-itary files at a federal warehouse

in St. Louis. The newly found records cover the years from 1942 to 1945 and from 1950 to 1954. A toll-free number of the nearest VA regional office is listed in the Federal Government section of telephone directories.
