New Phone Service Begins December 1, at Quitaque

GTE and International Mobile Machines Corporation (IMM) will put the new telephone system into service on December 1, 1992 for approxi-

mately 420 Quitaque customers. "This is an exciting new technology," said Hardy White, GTE's MidWest Texas Division Manager. "We're proud to be able to offer this to our cutomers in Quitaque. We hope the community shares in our excite-

The wireless system is called Basic Exchange Tele-commiunmications Radio Service (BETRS). The quality of service will be enhanced by the new system. Some might see an antenna on the telephone pole outside their home, and phone radio cluster units will be located on concrete pads in various locations.

The wireless concept will provide private line telephone and data services to GTE customers. GTE will upgrade the existing outside plant equipment from wire to digital radio and eliminate the local central office switching equipment. In highcost rural areas, digital radio is more cost effective than wire and cable.

Another advantage is realized in the ongoing maintenance savings associated with long rural subscriber loops. Other advantages are the quality of service compared to open wire and the ease that new customers may be added to the


Farm Loans **Applications**

The Mexican Hairless dog has no coat of hair. The bare-skinned dog, which weighs about 12 pounds, originated in China and was imported to Mexico by sailors.



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
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
