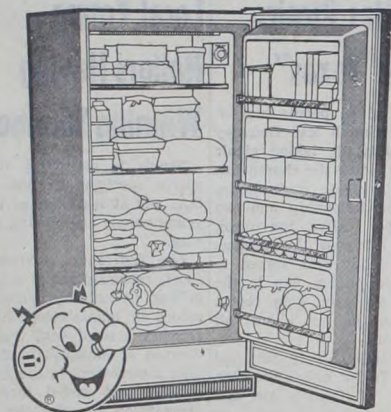

TAKE ADVANTAGE OF SALES: Avoid overstocking with commercially frozen food that's always available; use your freezer as your own bargain counter and store foods you can buy on sale. But do allow space for short-time baked goods, leftovers and special party foods.

LOCK IN FLAVOR: Use moisture and vapor-proof materials especially designed for freezers to wrap your foods. Tightly sealed, these lock in flavor and moisture and prevent "freezer burn" (surface drying) on foods. Don't use wax paper, bread paper or regular cellophane for freezer foods.

age. We go first to Akaka Falls, probably the most beautiful waterfall of the Pacific almost as haunting as the song written about it. Then on to Kilauea Crater in Volcano National Park. We had lunch in the Old Volcano house on the crater's rim. The dining room can seat 2500 people at once. You can peer over the crater's rim from the scenic dining room windows and watch the bubbling and smoking fissures of Kilauea. We never realized the lava flow was so extensive, miles and miles of lava fields that look like desolate moonscapes alternating with luxuriant fern forests. The lava flows reach to the highway and huge cracks in the ground are seen.

On the island of Hawaii grows the most perfect nut according to Burbank, the Macadamia Nut which is crisp and delicately flavored.

Also on this island is the famed Parker Ranch, the second largest in the United States but said to be the most beautiful.

We stopped at Kalapana Beach where the sand is black. It is made up of pulverized lava flow. We did picture taking and shopping here.

The group also toured a lava tube created centuries ago. The outside cooled first while the inner stream flowed on leaving an eerie cave.

Now we drive on to the southern most tip of the USA, then on to Kona passing many coffee plantations on the way. When the coffee beans are ripe they are red and are hand-picked. Not all the beans ripen at one time. Kona and Hilo are the two main cities of this island. Population not being over 12,000 permanent residents. Kona is famous for Blue Marlin fish. Some of these fish weigh one ton. Golf is a famous sport as well as on the other islands. There are thirty golf courses on the six main islands. On this island we saw trees with growths hanging down looking like sacks of sausage. Our guide told us they were Sausage Trees but "we could not eat them as they are full of bologna." We depart for Oahu on our Aloha plane and at the airport we get our car from the parking area and eat dinner and go to our condominium as we have another early trip the next day.

Monday, June 28—The day we fly to Maui the second largest island which is called the Valley Isle. It acquired its name from the great sweeps of rolling valley that links the two volcanoes which formed the island. Again we are met by a tour guide and a large scenic bus, in the city of Kahului which is the largest city on the island. There is only one hospital on the island but several dispensaries (pharmacies). The city has a mayor with an annual salary of \$53,000 and nine councilmen with salaries of \$15,000 each.

Some of the plants we saw were monkey pod trees, banyan trees, rooster plant, croton, beefsteak plants, bottlebrush trees (blossoms shaped like bottles), ironwood trees, plumeria from which perfume is made, Chinese cracker plant, Hawaiian money tree (brings prosperity), cooking and

eating bananas, mangos, papayas, woodroses, upside down lobster claw holley, Norfolk pine, ti leaves (used to make grass skirts). Poi is made from Taro plants. We also saw Koa (dried beans), ginger plants, coconut palms, angel trumpets, orchids, carnations and the Internal Revenue Tree (Eucalyptus) and many others.

On the way to Lahaina we had a stop to visit a Coral Factory and heard a lecture about coral and its formation in the ocean and shopped in the gift shop there.

At Lahaina we had a two-hour stop. This was once a whaling port. Lahaina has a famed banana tree, the largest in the islands which covers the entire city park. Along Front Street paralleling the ocean gaily painted shops with a turn of the century air sells arts, crafts, coral, carved wooden items and the best ice cream. In Lahaina small boats glide in and out.

Next we go to Kaanapali where there are golden sand beaches, a tennis ranch, two golf courses, bungalows and lovely beach hotels. Pineapples from this area are shipped by barge to the island of Oahu. Return again to Honolulu by Aloha plane.

I will try to tell you some of the agricultural aspects of the islands. I was taking notes all the time the tour director talked so he said he better give all of his information correctly. We were told that tourism is first in industry, sugar cane, second, and pineapples are third. The people have to dig rocks from the ground before they can plant. Thirty thousand sugar cane plants are grown on one acre of land. It takes one ton of water to produce one ounce of sugar. Sugar cane will grow 30 or 40 feet tall. Sugar plantations have their own highways. One tire on their trucks costs \$5,000. The leaves on the stalks are burned before harvest. The pineapples are planted by hand and gathered by machine. Only one pineapple grows on a plant. It takes a plant about 18 months to have a pineapple ready for production but the people are planting and gathering all the time as there is no set season there as the temperature remains constant.

I asked our guide if English was taught in the schools and he informed me that only one school teaches Hawaiian language and all others teach in English. There are only 12 letters in the Hawaiian alphabet—*a-e-i-o-u-p-w-m-n-l-k* and *h*. No ugly words in the Hawaiian language only the way they are pronounced makes them sound that way.

All the tour guides were very

nice and sweet to Emily. They sang love songs to her and played their ukeleles for her. Told her she was an excellent traveller.

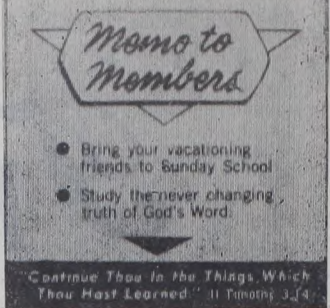

Arrive in Lubbock at 1:30 in the morning and it is nice to be met on the mainland by our children. Arrive in Turkey at five in the morning.

These are our sentiments expressed by Mark Twain:

THE LOVELIEST FLEET OF ISLANDS THAT LIES ANCHORED IN ANY OCEAN No land in all the world has any deep strong charm for me but one; no other land could so longingly and beseechingly haunt me sleeping and waking, through half a lifetime, as that one has done. Other things leave me but it abides; other things change but it remains the same. For me its balmy airs are always blowing, its summer seas flashing in the sun; the pulsing of its surf-beat

is in my ear; I can see its garlanded crags; its leaping cascades; its plummy palms drowsing by the shore; its remote summits floating like islands above the cloudrack;

I can feel the spirit of its woodland solitudes; I can hear the splash of its brooks; in my nostrils still lives the breath of flowers that perished twenty years ago.

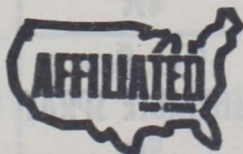
