Lynn Godfrey-Brian Hughes Attend Legion Boys State in Austin

AUSTIN — The 34th annual American Legion Boys State, sponsored by the Department of Texas, on the UT Campus, got underway June 12, with 372 school boys from Texas and two from Mexico registering.

Among those registering from Baird Post 82 was Lynn Godfrey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Godfrey. Brian Hughes, a West Point cadet, was selected to represent West Point at Boys State. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Hughes of Baird.

Following registration, each citizen was assigned to one of two political parties - Nationalist or Federalist. Each citizen then functions as a member of his party. He attends its precinct, county and state conventions and votes in its primary.

Boys State helps to develop civic leadership and pride in American citizenship. This program arouses a keen interest in the detailed study of our government. These civic workshops stress the importance of maintaining our form of government and bring better understanding of our national traditions and beliefs to the more than 28,000 young men who are participating this year.

In Boys State, the American Legion provides the type of program where the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it. The boy learns to do by doing.

The program takes an added significance since the vote has been extended to 18 year olds. Most Boy Staters are in the 16 to 17 age category.

Highlight of Boys State will be a trip to the Capitol Tuesday morning where the elected Boys State Official will be given an opportunity to serve in his

respective office for a day. Boy State enrollment this year brings the total to 18,351 junior high school boys who have attended since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

Pennies . . . From Heaven, Piggy Banks, Pickle Jars and Old Socks

BAIRD — One of the most patriotic acts Americans of all ages can perform today is emptying the family piggy bank, according to Fred Goble, Pres. of First National Bank of Baird.

Goble said the nation faces a penny shortage that costs taxpayers millions because people are withholding some 30 billion pennies from circulation.

This means that nearly half of the 62 billion pennies that the U. S. Mint has produced in the last 15 years are in hiding. The Mint is still producing one-cent coins at a rate of 35 million a day, he added, yet there still aren't enough pennies to go around in many areas of the nation.

Goble urged that families start gathering those pennies that are hiding in pickle jars, old socks and piggy banks and bring them into the bank so the nation can get Mr. Lincoln among the people where he belongs.

June has been declared Penny Redemption month by the Mint in an effort to cure this artificial shortage, Goble said.

"For every \$25 worth of pennies cashed in at the bank, the U. S. Treasury is going to award an Exceptional Public Service certificate to the individual or group responsible," Mr. Goble added.

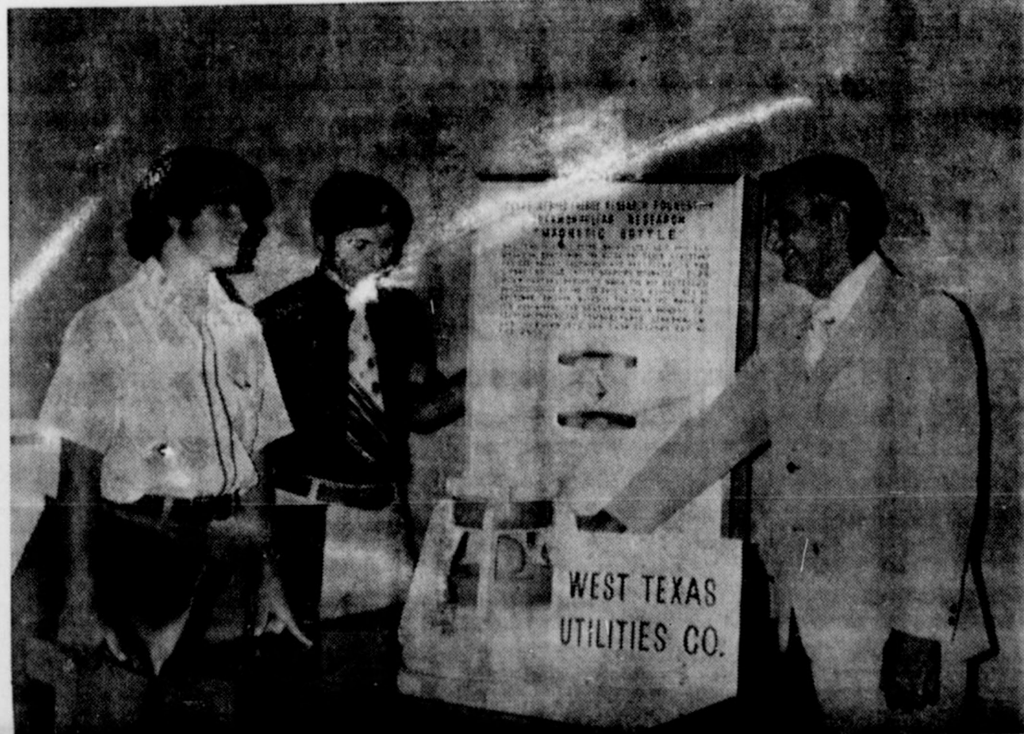
Tommy has participated in football, basketball, and is a member of the National Honor Society. He also competed in the UIL Science and Number Sense competition and won 4th in State competition in Science.

Clyde Represented at WTU'S Nuclear Science Symposium

AUSTIN — Twenty outstanding students and teachers from the area served by West Texas Utilities Company attended the 13th annual Nuclear Science Symposium at the University of Texas in Austin. The conference got underway Monday, June 3 and ended Thursday, June 6.

The Symposium was jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas. West Texas Utilities is one of the sponsoring companies.

The 500 selected high school science students and teachers who attended the session were offered the rare opportunity of hearing lectures by some of the nation's outstanding nuclear scientists.

The Foundation was formed for the primary purpose of conducting the world's first and largest privately financed research effort in the field of nuclear energy. Currently, the Foundation and the University

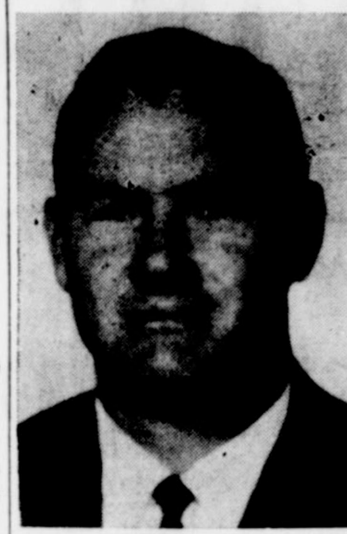
are sponsoring a program in nuclear fusion research aimed at controlling thermonuclear reactions for the production of electric power. Fusion is the energy process of the sun and the stars.

The goal of the Foundation and WTU is not research alone, but to assist in the advancement of the knowledge of nuclear science in Texas schools. Of special interest to the sponsors is bringing to students and teachers a realization of the privileges, responsibilities and opportunities which scientific discoveries in the field of nuclear energy presents.

WTU paid all expenses for the 20 students and teachers attending from schools in the area served by the company.

There are over 1,000 accredited senior high schools in the state of Texas. Clyde can be justly proud of its high school for having been chosen as one of the 150 high schools in the state invited to send students and teachers to the Symposium.

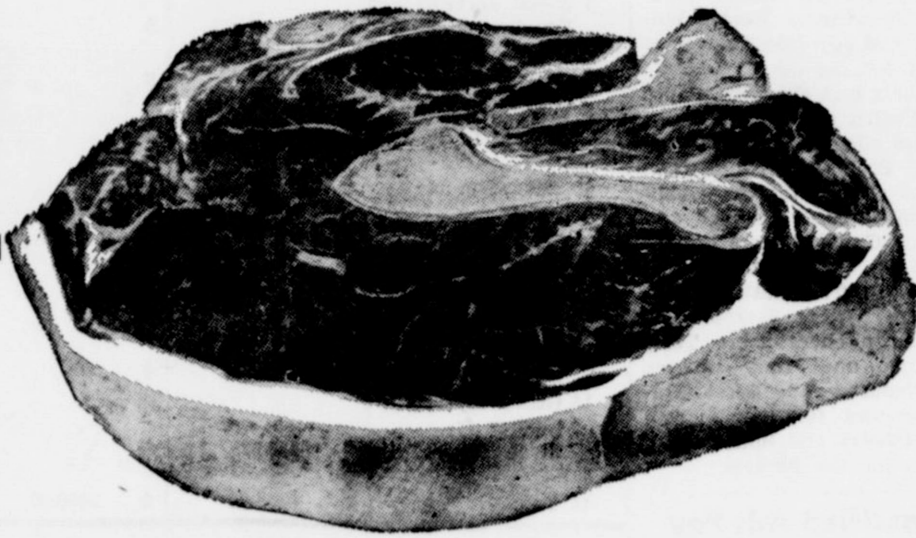
