Back when the streets of Turkey were being paved down through the main part of town, some of the dirt had to be removed from the street. This was done by a walking turning plow, pulled by two extra large horses then hauled out by a frisno operated by hand and also pulled by the horses.

The Ozark trail monument stood in the middle of the street and had to be removed before the paving took place, as it weighed several tons and no heavy machinery to move it with It was decided to dig a large hole in the street and bury it, which they did. The monument was built back about 1920 by a committee from Oklahoma and the two closest ones standing is by the old Tampico store building about seven miles east of Turkey and one at the court house square in

Before the street was paved, telephone poles had been put in front of the stores by the side walk on the north side of the street, and about twenty wires to each pole. The wires went to a central office where an operator was on duty twenty four hours a day. One night a norther and snow strorm blew in from the north and laid all the poles down in the street. This caused the telephone company a lot of trouble but the poles and wires were removed and put in the alley.

market futures through transactions. The economist hedging is speculation, but a strategy to reduce the price risk. He said farmers should be able to "lock" in a slightly higher price with this method but they need to have an understanding of the mechanics of hedging and realize they are still subject to basis risk.

Hedging in the futures market reduces the risk of a price decline but, like cash contracting, it also eliminates any possible gains from a price increase said Smith.

To manage price risks, the farmer should consider the range of marketing alternatives, noted the economist. This includes the newest pricing tool available commodity options. Options offer a type of insurance against adverse price turns that require no margin deposits and allows buyers to participate in favorable price moves. Because of the premiums to be paid for the options, the cotton farmer will not likely be able to "lock" in as high a price as he might with a regular hedge, but he does not give up the opportunity to benefit from a favorable price change, said Smith

Smith noted that there are several marketing strategies to consider. One that might be attractive to some is using a cash forward contract to sell cotton and call option to protect the deficiency payment. Some producers that have not yet priced their cotton have already used call options to protect their deficiency

payment. Smith stressed producers should at least contact a cotton buyer or commodity broker to find out what is being offered. Cotton farmers can currently price their cotton above loan, but if they think cotton prices will hold through harvest, there is reason to be out the additional costs involved in forward contracting




