The Commissioners and committee hope the lines will be divided into proportions so they will not have to be moved again for several years. But if the need should arise, they will be subject to adjustment.

The lines shown on the County map last week, at this time seem to be close to where the final lines will rest, but they still may, have to be adjusted.

The County is presently divided into the following precincts: Baird, Clyde and Eula; Precinct 1: Baird, Putnam, and parts of Admiral, Precinct 2: Cross Precinct 4; and Oplin, Eula, Denton Valley, and Dudley, Precinct 3.
