Quitaque City Secrectary, David Brunson, offered some suggestions to possible pre-vention of freezing pipes, "residents need to leave a faucet running slowly, not the hot water, because that will increase their heating bill, leave bottom cabinet doors open, wrap outside faucets with a towel, then with plastic to keep out moisture. People should use a lamp or electric heater when attempting to thaw water pipes, never use a torch, and leave the heat on in homes, when they must go out for a while."


